The resolution of Alderman Ferguson was then read, as follows:

Whereas, This council having

through its committee duly instructed for that purpose, made a fair and reasonable effort to obtain the right of way for the extension of Summit st. easterly from Beakes st. to Detroit st.; also a release of damage likely to be occasioned thereby, and this council doth declare that such right of way has not been acquired by purchase or otherwise, for the reason that they were not able to agree with the persons interested in the land and tenements, required therefor, or affected thereby, therefore

Resolved, That the city clerk do certify this resolution to the city attorney, who is hereby directed forthwith to institute proceedings in condemnation, and acquire such right of way and settle such and all such claims for damages.

Ald. Martin moved that Ald. Herz's motion be laid on the table.

Which was lost by a yea and nay vote as follows:

Whereas, Detroit st. at and near its junction with Beakes st. has been considerably narrwood by the street rail-

way track, and it appearing that the safety of the traveling public require that such street at such point be widened, therefore

Resolved That the widening of Detroit street along lot number sixteen block four, Ormsbey & Page's addition to the city, is a necessary public improvement, that the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) be and the same is hereby appropriated from the contingent fund for the purpose of purchasing said lot No. 16, from the A. A. Gas Co. that an order therefor be drawn payable Feb. 1st next for such purpose, that delivery of such order be made on delivery of a good and sufficient deed of said lot. that after such purchase said lot be graded and used for street purpose thus widening both Detroit and Eeakes sts.
