Gentlemen:-We hereby propose to continue the present contract for lighting the city of Ann Arbor for one year commencing Jan. 1st, 1892, under the conditions and upon the same terms as at present in force, viz: eighty arc lights (80) at eightyone dollars ( $\$ 81.00$ ) each per year, lights to burn two hundred and sixtyfive (265) nights from dusk until 12.30 o'clozk a. m. The lighting to be done under the direction oit the Lighting Committee. Additional lights, should any be required, to be furnished upon the same terms. Also additional lighting, other than the time above specified, at proportional rates.

Resoived, That the city clerk do certify this resolution to the city attorney, who is hereby directed forthwith to institute proceedings in condemnation, and acquire such right of way and settle such and all such claims for damages.

way track, and it appearing that the safety of the traveling public require that such street at such point be widened, therefore

Resolved That the widening of Detroit street along lot number sixteen block four, Ormsbey \& Page's addition to the city, is a necessary public improvement, that the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) be and the same is hereby appropriated from the contingent fund for the purpose of purchasing said lot No. 16, from the A. A. Gas Co. that an order therefor be drawn payable Feb. 1st next for such purpose, that delivery of such order be made on delivery of a good and sulficient deed of said lot, that after such purchase said lot be graded and used for street purpose thus widening both Detroit and Eeakes sts.
