I have inspected every orchard known to me, and found the disease to prevail in all of them but 3, viz: in that of the estate of Wm. Campbell, Lennou, and McDonald. I mention the latter three as a matter of record, and to

see how they will stand in the future.
The extent of the disease in the different orchards varies greatly. While in some orchards less than one per cent. were affected, in one small orchard, or garden, seventy-five per o' the trees were affected with the dis-The worst was that of Frederick Wurscent. o' ease. ter, in which 14 out of the 20 trees growing were diseased.

All the owners of diseased trees cheerfully consented to remove the trees marked as affected.

Only bearing orchards were inspected. The disease is rarely found in younger orchards, and can be recognized best when the fruit is on the tree, nearing the ripening stage.
