Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted, the following Petitions and Communications were presented:

To the Common Council.

We the undersigned inspectors of election appointed by resolution of the Council to conduct the meeting of the electors of the city of Ann Arbor called by the order of this Council for the third day of July 1899, to determine by ballot and authorize the raising by taxation the sum of seventeen thousand dollars for the purpose of purchasing a site for a Homoeopathic hospital, respectfully submit a report of the result of the said elector's meeting as follows.

Due notice of the said elector's meeting having been given pursuant to law, the meeting assembled at Fireman's Hall in the City of Ann Arbor and the polls were open at seven o'clock in the forenoon and held open until five o'clock in the afternoon on the third day of July aforesaid. The question submitted and determined at the said elector's meeting was, "shall the Common Council be authorized to raise by tax the sum of seventeen thousand dollars for the purchase of a site for a Homoeopathic hospital."

There was cast upon said question by ballot in all six hundred and sixtysix votes and the said votes were cast

as follows.

For the raising of a fund of seventeen thousand dollars for the purchase of a Homoeopathic hospital site, yes, six hundred and fifty votes.

For the raising of a fund of seventeen thousand dollars for the purchase of a Homoeopathic hospital site, no, sixteen votes.

Therefore be it resolved that it is hereby ordered that the sum of seventeen thousand dollars be and the same is hereby levied and assessed on and against the taxable property of the City of Ann Arbor, and the same is ordered to be spread on the tax roll of said City of Ann Arbor for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninetynine, and the City Assessor is hereby ordered and required to spread, assess and levy the said sum of seventeen thousand dollars on the regular City assessment roll for the year A. D. 1899, and against the taxable property of the City of Ann Arbor pursuant to law.

Resolved further, that the City Clerk do certify this resolution and order of assessment to the City Assessor without delay.
