ORDINANCE.

Ald. Stevens introduced the following Ordinance for its third reading:

An Ordinance relative to Street Paving, and to amend:

Section 7 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance relative to street paving," passed on the 19th day of December, A. D. 1898, approved Dec. 23, 1898.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain.

Section 1. That section seven of an ordinance relative to street paving, passed December 19, 1898, and approved December 23, 1898, be and the same is hereby amended, to read as follows:

Section 7. After the certification of any such assessment district as provided in section six of this ordinance, the Common Council may at any regular meeting thereof by a resolution adopted by a majority of all the members elect, authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute under their hands and the seal of the City of Ann Arbor, bonds of the City of Ann Arbor payable to bearer in ten equal annual installments annually on or before the first day of March in each year thereafter, with interest not exceeding five per cent per annum payable annually in a sum or sums equal in amount to the estimated cost of the construction of any such pavement. All such bonds shall be known as "Pavement Bonds," and issued in series conforming to the number of the paving district on account of which any such bond shall have been issued. All which bonds shall be delivered by the City Clerk to the City Treasurer. Provided, that no more than sixty thousand dollars in amount of any such bonds shall be outstanding at any one time.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after legal publication.

There being no amendments the ordinance was adopted as follows:

Gentlemen—Your Committee on Streets have had the matters referred to them under consideration and would recommend the following:

That the alley in rear of Schairer & Millens store be graded and repaved with stone from rear of Bessimers store to Huron street:

That Henry Richards be permitted to lay an extension of track across Miller avenue providing the same does not conflict with any of the legal rights of the city, and that the R. R. Co. plank between their tracks.

That the appropriation of \$25 be allowed for the grading and gravelling S. Fourth avenue south of Hill street:

That the matter of gravelling Hill street from S. University avenue to Olivia avenue be deferred until next spring.

We have also examined the Huron street sewer estimate and find same correct and would recommend its allowance.
