Communication from the Mayor.

To the Members of the Common Council:

Gentlemen-I wish to record my disapproval of so much of your proceedings of Monday, May the 18th last, as relates to the amendment to our city charter and the appointment of я committee at the expense of the city, to make a junketing trip to Lansing to secure the passage of an amendment to our charter so as to provide for the payment of salaries to members of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Common Council and the Mayor of the City.

The main objection to giving compensation to aldermen is of a practical character. As a rule, in the past, men in the community, of intelligence, of pecuniary responsibility, of civic pride, have been willing to serve their fellowcitizens in the capacity of aldermen; regarding the same as a public duty which they owed to the citizens of the commonwealth. When this class of men are in charge of our municipal affairs we are safe, and there are not likely to arise any municipal scandals or municipal outrages and blunders. But when the office degenerates into one of mere pay for services, there will come into these places men of different character, whose conduct will be governed by other considerations than the public interest; private ends will be subserved, public interests sacrificed and municipal government dishonored. Our best men will decline to accept office under such circumstances.

The regents of the University serve without pay. The office thus becomes one of great honor.

Our school board serves without body in the neighborhood for blocks compensation and we get the best men heard for weeks the repairing and test-

thereon, who are glad and proud to act.

The directors of our banks serve without pay and thus our best business men serve thereon, as a matter of pride and honor.

And so it will be with our aldermen. Unless you wish to make the position of mayor, president of the council and members of the council the object of the grafter for the single and sole purpose of grafting, you will not countenance a change in our charter along these lines.

In my judgment, we can all serve the city best by adopting a policy of strict economy, having in mind the fact that we were entrusted with the reins of municipal government without expectation of pecuniary reward, and that if we perform our whole duty to the city and the taxpayers we shall be entitled to receive their gratitude, which is all we expected when we took our oaths of office.

Resignation of Ald. Schlenker.

To the Honorable Common Council:

Gentlemen---By the printed Council proceedings under date of May 18, I find you have failed to act on my resignation as alderman, as handed to the Clerk. Had it not been for Providence and the extreme frost and our brave fire department there would have been great loss of life and property, as the quick and successive explosions demonstrated. To substantiate this, everybody in the neighborhood for blocks ing of the damaged tanks. It was | then that the abutting property owners of the same block circulated a petition to cause those car tanks to be removed. There never were any such words used as warehouses or any sort of merchandise, nothing but the removal of those damaged and disconnected oil tanks was referred to. Nothing but simply separating extra combustible explosives and hazardous oil tan s from the resident portion of the petitioners was requested. This same petition was referred to the ordinance committee and city attorney, in the face of all those facts the council adopted a report which is contrary to all usages and customs and devoid of all justice and fairness, by permitting the relaying of the old pipe lines, the car tanks to be given a permanent location, and a station created, as a perpetual depot of explosives and highly inflammable oils, which will in course of time be a hindrance to the growth of that part of the city. If anyone thinks this is taken from a personal feeling, I will say that the Standard Oil Co. or the Republic Oil Co., which are doing business in our city would not dare to ask such favors.

Now, as an alderman I can only protest and denounce the maintenance of such risky, unsightly, contaminating concern, and therefore renew my resignation. Respectfully yours,

The first was caused by an error of three cents in the cashing of warrant No. 21,260, drawn May 6, which was cashed by the bank for three cents more than the bill was originally allowed by the finance committee. The second error was due to the fact that warrant 21.653 was drawn by the clerk for \$26.70 against the Street Fund instead of against the Contingent Fund. The latter error will be corrected by a resolution, introduced for the purpose of making several transfers with regard to accounts, most of which are not used at the present time.

For the past two years, I have made. several suggestions with regard to of changes in the method keeping some of the accounts of the city. Some of these have been acted upon by your body and others are in process of Some steps should be taken change. to secure a uniform date from which all financial transactions of the city are reckoned and thus avoid a good deal of the unnecessary quibbling over the question of the city finances.
