Moved and supported that Mr. Charles Edwards be recommended to the council as chief of the fire department for one year dating from the first of April, 1906, at \$75.00 per month. Carried.

The matter of hydrants was referred to the fire committee and city engineer on motion of Ald. Gill, supported by Ald. Fischer.

By request the council passed to consideration of ordinance on side track across Liberty street.

Ald. Fischer presented the following ordinance for its third reading:

AN ORDINANCE Authorizing the Construction by the Ann Arbor Railroad Company of a Side-Track across Liberty street.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That permission is hereby granted to the Ann Arbor Railroad Company to construct and maintain a side track across Liberty street, on the present grade of said street, at a distance of not more than five feet from the main track of said Company, for the accommodation of persons and corporations doing business adjacent to the tracks of said Railroad Company, provided, however, that the said Railroad Company shall provide and maintain suitable planking for said crossing, and shall do the work of laying said side track and constructing said crossing under the supervision and to the entire satisfaction of the City Engineer and the Board of Public Works of the City of Ann Arbor, and shall keep and maintain said crossing and the approaches thereto at all times in a suitable and safe condition for public travel.

And provided further, that during the hours when such side track is in use the said Railroad Company shall station and keep a flagman at said crossing for the protection of the pub-

lic, and that no cars shall be allowed to stand on said side track within 100 feet of the north line of said Liberty street.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the expiration of ten days from the legal publication thereof and the filing of the written acceptance thereof by the Ann Arbor Railroad Company.

The chair put the question "shall this ordinance pass?"

D. for the said several purposes aforesaid and it is ordered that the said several sums be assessed, levied and collected and paid to the city treasurer for the several funds aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the city clerk do certify this resolution and order of appropriation and assessment to the city assessor, and that when so certified, the city assessor do spread the said several sums of money aforesaid on and upon the tax roll of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan, for the year 1906 and assess the same against the taxable property of the city of Ann Arbor, as the same

has been set down in the tax rolls, or as the same shall or may be fixed or determined by the board of review of the said city, against the respective owners and occupants of the said taxable property pursuant to law.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Fischer presented the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE to Restrain and Regulate the Running at Large of Domesticated Rabbits, Hares, or Chickens, Ducks, Geese or Other Poultry.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons being the owner or owners, possessor or possessors, or person or persons having in charge or care any domesticated rabbits, hares or chickens, ducks, geese or other poultry, to permit or allow any of the same to go at large at any time within the limits of said city, to the damage or annoyance of any of its inhabitants.

Section 2. All persons convicted of the violation of the provisions of this

ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar, and not exceeding five dollars and costs of prosecution, and in the imposition of such fine and costs the court may impose a further sentence of imprisonment in the common jail of Washtenaw county until such fine and costs have been paid, not exceeding in all the period of thirty days.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

Special Committee on Printing.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

Gentlemen:—Your committee appointed to consider the several bids for city printing respectfully report:

That we have had three meetings of our committee and several conferences with the representatives of the several papers at their request. That at our first meeting we discovered that the bid of the Ann Arbor News only mentioned proceedings of the council and the question arose as to whether that would include all city printing. We notified the manager of that paper that if we were to consider his bid we would prefer that it be made more explicit and include proceedings of the board of public works and all legal notices. He said it was the intention to cover all city printing and he would cheerfully amend his bid to meet the wishes of the committee. We also notified the other two papers that they were at liberty to make any

changes in their bids that they desired and also that the committee would like a guarantee that the price would not exceed a certain limit for the next five years. The clerk, at our request, wrote to the clerks of twenty-five cities in this state, of as near the same class as Ann Arbor as possible, and asked the price paid for city printing and received replies from twenty-four of them showing a range of from six cents up to seventy cents per folio. We also inquired into the matter quite thoroughly in other ways, and your committee became convinced, after quite full investigation, that while there is not a great profit in printing the council proceedings at fifteen cents per folio, yet it is a living rate and about equal to what an individual having the same amount of work could get it done for, and in view of the fact that the proceedings of the council and board of public works possess a certain value to a newspaper as news, the rate of fifteen cents per folio is not unreasonably low. In fact six of the cities from which we received reports pay an average of about fifteen and one-half cents per folio for printing while some pay a much higher rate.

At our last meeting, held on May 17th, we received the bids hereto annexed, and, in order that full publicity may be given the proceedings of both the council and the board of public works, and in view of the further fact that the bids are quite reasonable, and it will cost the city nine cents per folio less to print them in all three papers than it has heretofore cost for printing them in two only, we recommend that all the bids for publishing the proceedings of the council and board of public works be accepted. And we further recommend that as the Ann Arbor News was the first paper to offer to reduce the price, that its bid for publishing the council proceedings in pamphlet form be accepted.
