Communication from Mayor. To the Honorable the Common Council.

Gentlemen: I return to you herewith without my approval an ordinance passed at your session of July 20th, 1908, entitled, "An Ordinance relating to Garbage and Refuse."

I apprehend that the only valid reason for the public control of the removal and disposition of garbage and refuse is a sanitary one, guarding and protecting of the pub-I do not believe the orlic health. dinance mentioned will insure that I do not believe it will inresult. sure the removal of the garbage and that under its operation much of the city's garbage will be allowed to fespremises ter and decay upon the where it is made and thus become a menace to the public health and thus will be defeated the very purpose for which the ordinance is enacted. result is practically insured by the very heavy cost entailed upon householder.

The maximum charge fixed by the ordinance for the removal of garbage which can be removed in one can is fifty cents a month or six dollars maximum This will, of year. course, be the actual Very cast. many households will be absolutely excluded from complying with provisions of the ordinance by enormous cost,—then the question arises,—How are these households to dispose of their garbage? There is but one answer. It will be badly disposed of and in many instances not at all, until the health officer takes up the matter and disposes of it at the city's expense.

Under the present system, which all will admit, of course, is not al-

together satisfactory, the public pays the expense of garbage removal. The contract is costing the city \$200 month, or\$2,400 a year. Now the assessed valuation of the city is in round numbers \$12,000,000 tax, therefore, is twenty cents a year on an assessed valuation of \$1,000, a very moderate cost to the tax payers of the city. By wards the cost is as follows: First ward, \$609.75; ward, \$350.85; third ward, \$213.80; fourth ward, \$405.00; fifth \$33.00; sixth ward, \$396.40; seventh ward, \$389.60.

These figures show conclusively that the present plan of removing garbage is by no means a burden and that the existing ordinance may be improved and perfected without adding any considerable load to any one taxpayer.

On the other hand, if the proposed ordinance becomes operative the cost upon our citizens will be enormously increased. There are 3.000 dences in the city and in some of these residences there are two even moret than two families. If every residence complied with the nance the cost of garbage removal would run into the large figures of \$18,000. 600 But suppose anly households comply with the ordinance, the cost for these mount up to the sum of \$3,600. is \$1,200 more than the cost of the present system and only 600 households are taken care of. What is to be done with the garbage of the other 2500 households? The under the proposed ordinance will in my opinion make it a dead letter.

There are other reasons which might be urged against the proposed ordinance, second in importance only to those already given.

To insure a safe and proper disposition of the garbage of the there is apparently but one way, and that is for the city to cause it to be removed and have the expense of said removal paid by the public. stated in the beginning, the only public concern in the matter is the securproper sanitation and guarding and protecting of the public health in the interest of the entire community, and as this is a vital

community interest its cost should be paid by the community ' at large. Should the proposed ordinance be enacted, all the difficulties will be encountered in disposing of the garbage that have been met with under the present system. The city will have to deal with a contractor just the same as now and a dumping ground will have to be provided, and if the contractor proves inefficient, garbage will be no better collected than present. In fact, with the contractor collecting his fees in payment of from the individual services householder. his discouragements will be vastly increased and the unpleasant features of his job greatly added to. These added burdens surely will not tend to increase the efficiency of any contractor. thoroughly reliable contractor can be secured at a reasonable advance over the present price paid under the existing ordinance, and the holding of a contractor to the conditions of his contract will make said ordinance reasonably effective and if the trial already given that ordinance has developed omissions and defects. should be added to and be improved to the end that the city's sanitary condition may be made safe and at an expense no greater than is necessary to the securing of that end.
