To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

Gentlemen:—Your special committee, to whom was referred the proposition to try to settle the "Flood Cases," so-called, respectfully report:

That there are twenty-five of these claims, upon which actions have been commenced, ranging from \$75 to \$2,000, and aggregating over \$12,700, besides the Richards and Bird cases already tried, in which judgments were obtained against the City, the judgment in the Richards case has been paid and the one in the Bird case is still unpaid, the City having decided to appeal to the Supreme Court.

In order to make a report to the Council that would be of any value, your committee conceived it to be necessary to inquire into the merits of each case, so far as possible, to ascertain how much damage each claimant had actually suffered.

Accordingly, we viewed the premises several times, and talked with the claimants, and got their statements in detail as to their damages, and what in their opinion was the cause of the damage wherever possible, and in cases where we could not find the parties, or finding them were unable to get statements of damages, we got the best information we could by inquiry.

We found that the actual damages sustained were greatly exaggerated in the claims filed in Court. Generally speaking, we think the claims as filed were about four times as much as the actual damage.

After informing ourselves as best we could in each case and carefully considering the matter, we believe that the actual damages suffered by these 25 claimants is about \$3,000. A statement of the amount of each one's damage has been furnished the attorneys for the claimants, and is as follows:—

After the thorough examination which we have given the matter, your Committee is convinced that the City should not be held responsible for any damage on account of that flood for several reasons, applying with greater or less force to each particular case; but the main, general reasons may be stated as follows: The dwelling houses and other property damaged were all situated on low lands along Allen's creek, some of the dwellings and other buildings being but little above the level of the creek. The principal reason given for trying to hold the City liable for the damage is that, they claim that the culverts along the creek were too small to carry the water, and that therefore the water was forced over the banks and did the damage. Nearly all who witnessed the flood agree that it was caused by an unprecedented rainfall or cloudburst, which in a few moments raised the water in many parts of the City several inches, and some say a foot high on the level, and every street leading to Allen's creek was a torrent in itself, and Allen's creek soon became so swollen that its banks in many places were several feet under water.

One claimant stated to your committee that the water was actually four feet deep in Main street directly over the culvert in the creek, and the stream or flood was then at least 20 of 30 rods wide at that point. We were also told by the claimants that the force of the water was so strong as to move and carry away barns and other outbuildings, many tons of coal, a set of wagon scales, a binder, several mowing machines and other farm machinery, much of which was never found.

It is apparent, therefore, that the flood was of such a character as to be beyond the capacity of any culverts that could reasonably be expected to be provided for a small stream that a man can ordinarily step across; and that it would have been practically impossible to provide culverts along that creek of sufficient size to carry the water of that flood. Therefore, we

think the City is not legally liable for damage by a flood which could not have been foreseen or provided against, any more than for damage by a tornado.

However, considering the fact that trials in two of the flood cases have resulted adversely to the City, and in view of the difficulty in getting juries without prejudice or bias against cities in such cases; and in view of the enormous expense to the City of the trials of those cases even if successful, and the great amount of costs and expenses to the City if successful, your Committee believe that the wisest course will be to settle the said 25 cases by paying the sum of \$3,000, that being the amount of damages actually suffered by the claimants.

Accordingly, after several meetings with the Attorneys for Plaintiffs your Committee have agreed with them to recommend to the Council the payment of said sum in full settlement of all of said cases, and they have agreed with us to accept it.

We therefore recommend that the sum of \$3,000 be paid to the Attorneys for the several claimants in those cases, in full settlement of all said claims, upon the actions being dismissed. The City to be to no other cost or expense except to pay its own costs incurred by it in defense of said actions. And that the details of closing up the matter be left to the City Attorney and City Clerk. Your Committee also recommend that upon settlement of all the cases as above, that the appeal by the City in the Bird case be dismissed, and the Clerk authorized to draw a warrant for the amount of the judgment.
