To the Honorable the Common Council:  
Gentlemen—Your committee on  
sewers, to whom was referred the es-  
timate and report of the City Engineer  
relative to the construction of lateral  
sewer in Lateral Sewer district No.  
35, beg leave to report that they have  
had such estimate and report, as well  
as the resolution of the Council, under  
consideration, and have made due in-  
quiries relating thereto, and have  
heard all persons desiring to be heard

in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of such lateral sewer, and that special taxing or assessment districts ought to be fixed by the Common Council upon and against which the construction of such sewer may be charged, street crossings excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided.

Your committee further recommends that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said district be prepared by the City Engineer, and the Board of Public Works ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of above named sewer.

Special Committee on Swimming Pool.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your special committee, to whom was referred the matter of life preservers and swimming pool, make the following report: We have personally investigated the location, the old mill race, and have found it to be a very dangerous place for swimming because the water increases very rapidly in depth from edge of the race so that only expert swimmers can consider themselves safe here.

If possible we would suggest that the city build a swimming pool at some point which might be connected with the river by tiling. In this way the depth of water could be controlled and by providing the swimming basin with an apparatus for flushing it out it could be kept clean. In this way many human lives would be saved.

When this swimming pool is established, people should be prohibited by law from using the mill race for swimming purposes. To provide for the present requirements, or until such a new swimming pool is established, we have ordered six new life preservers at an expense of \$19.50. To each of two of these about 100 feet of one-half inch rope has been fastened. The rope is to be wound loosely around a stake placed on one side of the old bridge across the race and the other on the opposite side so that either or both may be thrown out to any one who is found to be in danger from drowning.

Just south of the boat house, and in front of some willow trees, where most of the fatal drowning accidents have happened, we have caused to be placed two life preservers on each side of the race. To each life preserver is fastened about seventy-five feet of one-half

inch rope to be used in cases of emergency. We have also caused a rope, about two hundred feet long, to be fastened to the branch of a tree north of the boat house and carried out into the stream as far as one can wade with safety. At this point the rope is fastened to a barrel for a buoy, to which is also fastened an anchor. Then the rope is carried about one hundred feet down the stream with a barrel and anchor fastened at its middle and another at the lowest point in the stream from whence it is carried inwards and fastened to a tree. The purpose of the rope is to indicate the danger point in the stream and for people to catch hold of when in danger of drowning.

We have also had about fifty card-boards printed, containing directions for resuscitating drowned persons, and had them nailed up in conspicuous places at the mill race. Also, we have had fifty card-boards printed, warning people not to tamper with or steal the life preservers or any of the rope placed there for the purpose of helping to save people from being drowned, and that any persons found guilty of the above would be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

STREET SPRINKLING DISTRICT NO. 1.

By Ald. Murray: Resolved that the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor do declare that they deem it necessary that Packard street in said city should be wet down or sprinkled from Main street to Wells street to the end that the health and comfort of the people may be thereby conserved, therefore
