An Ordinance to Regulate and Control the Driving of Automobiles. Motor-Velicles and Other Vehicles Within the City of Ann Arbor.

The Common Council of the city of

Ann Arbor ordain:

No person shall operate an Sec. 1. autemobile, motor cycle, or other motor vehicle, on any street or puolic highway in the business and closely built up portions of the corporation. at a greater rate of speed than ten miles an hour, or on any street or public highway elsewhere in the corloration, or on any park driveway, at a greater rate of speed than fifteen miles an hour.

Sec. 2. The owner, operator, driver or person in charge of any cart, dray, wagon, hackney coach, omnibus, automot..., motor cycle, motor vehicle, carriage or other vehicle, except except street cars, used, propelled or driven upon any street, alley or public place of the corporation shall conform to ard observe the following rules of the

roa

1. All vehicles shall be driven in a careful manner, and with due regard for the safety and convenience of otn-

er vehicles and of pedestrians.

2. Every vehicle shall keep on the right side of the road or street, except when necessary to turn to the left in crossing of in overtaking another vehicle.

3. Vehicles going in opposite directions shall pass each other on the

right.

4. Every vehicle overtaking another vehicle shall keep to the left of the

overtaken vehicle in passing.

- 7. Every driver of a vehicle, when waring, Goodyear, Hochrein, Ramsay, such vehicle is approaching a street car stopping for the purpose of taking on or discharging passengers, shall give some signal plainly visible or audible to such passengers, shall keep such vehicle at least six feet from the running beard or lower step of such car; and if, either by reason of the presence of vehicles at the place where such car is stopping, or by reason of the narrowness of the street, it is not possible to preserve said distance of six feet from running board or lower step, the driver of said vehicle shall stop the same until such car shall have taken on or discharged its passengers and again started.
 - No vehicle shall stand or stop 8. within any street intersection so as to obstruct the free passage of vehicles
 - and pedestrians.
 9. No vehicle shall stop at any crosswalk or sidewalk in such manner as to obstruct the free passage of pedestrians on such crosswalk or sidewalk, or for a longer period than is necessary to permit persons to alight from or to enter said vehicle
 - 10. No vehicle shall stop street, except within two feet of the curb, or in any such way as to obstru free passage on the street, oro-vided, that this rule shall not apply when a driver of a vehicle is compelled to stcp by reason of rule 7 of this section.
 - 11. No vehicle shall cross any thoroughfare or make any turn thereon at a greater speed than one-half the legal speed limit upon such thoroughfare.
 - 12. Automobiles crossing any thoroughfare shall signal approaching vehicles and the vehicle nearest the approaching street intersection shail have the right of way wherever a traffic officer is not stationed; otherwise rule 5 must be strictly observed.

13. Vehicles moving stowly shall keep as near as may be convenient to the curb on the right allowing more swiftly moving vehicles free passage

on their left.

14. Drivers of motor vehicles before turning, stopping or changing their course, shall make sure that such movement can be made with safety.

Vehicles crossing from one side of the street to the other in the congester district, shall do so by turning to the left so as to head in the same direction as the traffic on that side of the reet toward which the crossing

16. No vehicle shall stop in the con-

gested district with its left side to the in this ordinance set forth. curb, and no automobile shall stop anywhere in the city with its left side

curb.

17. No vehicle shall remain backed up to the curb in the congested district unless it is actually loading or unloading, and in such case no longer than the actual loading or unloading

requires.

18. All automobiles shall carry the proper number of lamps, and shall, during the period from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise, display the number and kinds of lights required by state law. Automobile drivers may aid themselves in this rule by observing the general rule of lighting street lamps.

19. Automobiles leaving any public garage or alley, must stop before crossing the sidewalk line, and give proper signal, and the utmost care shall be used in entering same. Signals in such cases may be used freely.

20. The horse or horses attached to a vehicle backed up to the curb in the congested district shall be turned at right angles to the vehicle, and in the direction in which the traffic upon that side of the street is moving.

21. No person while under the influence of liquor shall drive any kind of a vehicle upon the streets, high-

ways or public places of the city.

Sec. 3. Lights on automobiles being operated or standing upon said streets, must be kept burning in front and rear during the time the city lights on the streets are lighted, and each of such automobiles shall carry the state license exposed in front and rear, as required by the state law.

Sec. 4. It shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance for any person charge or control of any vehicle in make with such vehicle or any device connected therewith any excessive noise to annoy the public or to open the muffler on any vehicle, or to permit such vehicle or any device thereon to emit smoke, gas or steam within the streets, highways or public places of this city.

Sec. 5. Each automobile and motor eycle upon any of the streets, highways or public places of this city provided shall be with adequate brakes, and with a suitable bell or horn for giving warning or signal of

its approach.

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to use upon any automobile or other vehicle a warning signal similar to that used by the Fire or Police Department of the city of Ann Arbor.

Sec. 7. All persons using bicycles or throw, or cause to be

Sec. 8. The driver of any vehicle shall stop and start upon the signal

from a police officer.

The Police Department, by Sec. 9. and with the consent of the mayor, shall have all powers and duties :n relation to the management of vehicular traffic Whenever the police department shall deem it advisable for the public safety or venience temporarily to close anv street, or parts of streets to vehicu ar traffic, or to vehicles of certain descriptions, or to divert the traific thereon, or to direct or direct course of pedestrian travel, said de-partment shall have power and authority to do so.

Sec. 10. The Police department shall see that this ordinance is posted in all public stables and at hack, cab and other stables, and shall keep copies of them at all of its stations and issue them upon application. And it shall be the duty of the owner and person in charge of all public stables, garages and other places where vehicles of any description are kept for hire to see that this ordinance is kept posted therein.

Sec. 11. It shall also be the duty of all persons keeping and operating delivery wagons, trucks, etc., to keep a copy of these regulations posted conspicuous places in their respective stables.

Sec. 12. It shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance for any person to hitch onto or get upon or take passage on any vehicle which is passing through or upon any cf the streets of this city, without the consent of the driver or operator of such vehicle.

Sec. 13. In case of accident to or collision with person or property, upon any of the public streets, parks parkways of the city of Ann Arbor, due to the driving or operation thereon of any vehicle, the person so driving or operating such vehicle shall stop and give such reasonable assistance as can be given, and shall upon request of the person injured, or any other person, give such person hisname and address, and if not the owner, the name and address of the owner of such vehicle, together with the registered number of such vehicle in case such vehicle is motor propelled.

Sec. 14. Any vehicle standing at the curb in the congested district shall move away from such curb at the re-

quest of a police officer.

Sec. 15. No person shall drop, place dropped, shall conform to the general rules as placed or thrown, upon any street in raid city, any glass, nails, tacks, wire, scraps of metal or any other substances rending to in ure the tires of any sulomobile, motor cycle actor vehicles.

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Sec. 16. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance dual he decined giulty of a misdemeans, and upon conviction thereof saull pe fined in the sum not exceeding \$25.00 for a first offense, and by a fine not less than \$25.00 and not exceeding \$50.00 for a second offense, and by a fine not less than \$50.00 and not more than \$100.00, or imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, for a third offense, and for any subsequent offense within one year, imprisonment, not less than ten days nor more than thirty days.
