By Ald. Ramsay: Resolved, That the common council of the city of Ann Arbor, asks his honor, Gov. Chase S. Osborn, to incorporate in his message to the legislature, a request for legislative action, permitting the city of Ann Arbor to bond itself for the purpose of building a Detention hospital, according to plans previously outlined.

It is moved that the president of the council appoint a committee of three, which committee, with the Health Officer shall do all in its power to secure this action. If the governor grants this action it will be the duty of this committee to try to secure the passage of such legislation through the legislature.
