University av., on Arch st. from Oakland av. to Packard st., on E. University av. from Tappan st. to Hill st., on Tappan from Hill to E. University av. on Hill st. from Oakland av. to Church st., on Ingalls st. from Hill to Monroe sts.; on Twelfth st. from Hill to Monroe sts.; on Monroe st. from Ingalls to Twellth sts. should be wet down or sprinkled to the end that the health and comfort of the people may thereby be conserved, therefore
