The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. That section seven of an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance relative to nuisances," passed February 3, 1896, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 7. The owner or keeper of any livery or other stable, barn or shed, within the limits of the city, shall keep the same and the yard thereto clean, and shall between the first day of May and the first day of the succeeding November of each year remove all manure from the premises once in two weeks.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

Moved by Ald. Fiegel, that section seven be amended by adding the

words, "and from November 1st to May 1st of each year all manure shall be removed from premises once a month."

Meeting called to order by Pres. Schmid. Present: Ald. Schlutz, Fiegel, Hanselmann, A. Lutz, Prochnow, Koernke, Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Hubbard, Rash, Groves, G. Lutz, and Pres. Schmid.

Moved by Ald. Schultz, that the special election for amendments to charter take place September 29th, 1913, and a special election to vote on the purchase and improvement of the water plant be called for Octo-

ber 13th, 1913. Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Schultz, Fiegel, Hanselmann, A. Lutz Prochnow, Koernke, Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Hubbard, Groves, G. Lutz, and Pres. Schmid. Ald. Rash excused from voting.

Moved by Ald. G. Lutz that it is the sense of those present that the Steere property, on which the city has an option, be purchased by the city as soon as money can be raised for same, and option on balance of property be procured. Adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 14. The committee adjourned. Ross Granger, Clerk.

Moved by Ald. Groves, that action of committee of the whole be adopted by the council.

Officers' Reports.

To the Comomn Council—Gentlemen: I respectfully call your attention to the condition of the city funds and recommend that no expenditure be contracted where money is not available. You will notice that the report includes transfers and expenditures ordered this date. The contracts include salaries to July 1, 1914, the time when another appropriation will be available under our present charter. The funds that will, July 14, show a deficit, have been in this condition since 1907 and this can not be overcome unless cleaned up by vote of people. As comptroller I make it my business to see that there is no overdrawn city funds February 1, when all warrants are payable, but I can not keep the funds clear from then on to the following July under the present arrangement. It is therefore necessary that we go slow and order improvements as money is provided. The approximate receipts shown take in the saloon and liquor licenses due in May together with fees from this and the treasurer's office to the contingent fund, burial permits,

etc., to the cemetery fund and reimbursement to the bridge, culvert and crosswalk fund from the Liberty and Huron street pavement funds for material paid for from this fund and used in the construction of said pavements. The following table shows money available for use between now and July 1 next and from this must come all expense not now contracted; such as care of city poor, care of horses, cleaning and repair of streets, labor outside of regular salaries, general supplies and in fact every incidental expense. The city has been to great expense the past few years in caring for storm water, investigating water supply, litigation and some things that should not enter into our expense account very heavily from this year on. Under the circumstances the city is to be congratulated on its financial condition and with a little patience on the part of all, our charter can be amended and some of the necessary improvements urged can be made if the people so vote. Until such time, I recommend that we forego any unusual expenditure.

Resolutions

By Ald. Prochnow: Resolved, that the sprinkling within the City of Ann Arbor, heretofore ordered, in the opinion of the common council is and is hereby deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.

Resolved, further, that all the lands, tenements and premises in the sprinkling districts fixed by the common council are deemed and declared to be benefited by the sprinkling heretofore ordered and it is hereby ordered and determined that all the costs of said public improvement, street intersections excepted, shall be and is hereby ordered to be levied on and assessed against the lands, tenements and premises situated in special district assessment hereinafter designated, Sprinkling District No. 11.

Resolved, further, that this common council hereby requires and orders the sum of \$1,224.00 to be raised by tax and a special assessment on and against the lots, parts of lots, lands, tenements in district aforesaid, and as a tax against the owners thereof. All to be assessed on and against said lands, tenements and premises according to the benefits coming to each parcel thereof from such local public improvement and the City Assessor is hereby required to levy and assess the said sum of money as aforesaid on and against the lands and tenements aforesaid on and upon the special assessment roll for the sprinkling district aforesaid, all to be assessed in the manner and for the purpose aforesaid pursuant to law.

Resolved, further, that the sum of \$172.00 is appropriated for the purpose of defraying the cost of such public improvement at intersections.

Resolved, further that the city clerk do certify this determination and order of assessment to the City Assessor pursuant to law.

Resolved, further, that all the lands, tenements and premises in the sprinkling districts fixed by the common council are deemed and declared to be benefited by the sprinkling heretofore ordered and it is hereby ordered and determined that all the costs of said public improvement, street intersections excepted, shall be and is hereby ordered to be levied on and assessed against the lands, tenements and premises situated in special district assessment hereinafter designated, Sprinkling District No. 12.

Resolved, further, that this common council hereby requires and orders the sum of \$614.00 to be raised by tax and a special assessment on and against the lots, parts of lots, lands, tenements in district aforesaid, and as a tax against the owners thereof. All to be assessed on and against said lands, tenements and premises according to the benefits coming to each parcel thereof from such local public improvement and the City Assessor is hereby required to levy and assess the said sum of money as aforesaid on and against the lands and tenements aforesaid on and upon the special assessment roll for the sprinkling district aforesaid, all to be assessed in the manner and for the purpose aforesaid pursuant to law.

Resolved, further, that the sum of \$68.00 is appropriated for the purpose of defraying the cost of such public improvement at intersections.

Resolved, further that the city clerk do certify this determination and order of assessment to the City Assessor pursuant to law.

Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Schultz, Fiegel, Hanselmann, Lutz, Prochnow, Koernke, Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Hubbard, Groves, Lutz, Pres. Schmid 13. Nays, none.

By Ald. Prochnow: Resolved, that

the sprinkling within the City of Ann Arbor, heretofore ordered, in the opinion of the common council is and is hereby deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.

Resolved, further, that all the lands, tenements and premises in the sprinkling districts fixed by the common council are deemed and declared to be benefitted by the sprinkling heretofore ordered and it is hereby ordered and determined that all the costs of said public improvement, street intersections excepted, shall be and is hereby ordered to be levied on and assessed against the lands, tenements and premises situated in special district assessment hereinafter designated, Sprinkling District No. 13.

Resolved, further, that this common council hereby requires and orders the sum of \$620.82 to be raised by tax and a special assessment on and against the lots, parts of lots, lands, tenements in district aforesaid, and as a tax against the owners thereof. All to be assessed on and against said lands, tenements and premises according to the benefits coming to each parcel thereof from such local public improvement and the City Assessor is hereby required to levy and assess the said sum of money as aforesaid on and against the lands and tenements aforesaid on and upon the special assessment roll for the sprinkling district aforesaid, all to be assessed in the manner and for the purpose aforesaid pursuant to law.

Resolved, further, that the sum of \$67.30 is appropriated for the purpose of defraying the cost of such public improvement at intersections.

Resolved, further, that the city clerk do certify this determination and order of assessment to the City Assessor pursuant to law.

By Ald. Prochnow: Resolved, that Monday, August 4th, 1913, be and the same is hereby fixed as the date, 7 p. m., the hour and the council chamber the place for the review of the assessment rolls of sprinkling districts Nos. 11, 12 and 13.

Resolved, further, that the city clerk do advertise the same according to law.

Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Schultz, Fiegel, Hanselmann, Lutz, Prochnow, Koernke, Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Hubbard, Groves Lutz, Pres. Schmid, 13. Nays, none.

Moved by Ald. Fiegel, that the city clerk notify the Detroit, Jackson and Chicago Railway Company to move the block signal, now on lawn extension in front of the residence of George Lutz on Packard street, out to curb line. Adopted.

Miscellaneous Business.

Mr. Arthur Brown called attention to the condition of sidewalk on north side of Huron street between Glen avenue and 14th street and the matter was referred to sidewalk committee.

Moved by Ald. Groves, that the city clerk be authorized to purchase such typewriter outfit as he needs in the office at a cost not to exceed \$150.00.

Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Schultz, Fiegel, Hanselmann, Lutz, Prochnow, Koernke, Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Hubbard, Groves, Lutz, Pres. Schmid, 13. Nays, none.
