To the Honorable Chas. A. Sauer,
Mayor of the City of Ann Arbor,
Michigan:

Dear Sir—I herewith tender you my resignation as a member of the Board of Fire Commissioners of the City of Ann Arbor to take effect as soon as possible.

I am compelled to take this action by reason of the following conditions existing in the department, and no remedy for which appears to be in immediate prospective.

As an official of a labor organization, which has prided itself, and made wonderful progress, in the provision of sanitary working conditions for its members, it is hardly conceivable that I should be requested to continue to serve on a body which has paid little or no attention to the sanitation of the fire stations that house its employes.

It has been a noted fact for a number of years, and has been called to the attention of the members of Council on various occasions that fire station No. 2 has been officially condemned on more than one occasion because of its unfitness to house human beings. Notwithstanding this knowledge, that Honorable body appears to have made absolutely no effort during my connection with the department, to provide suitable, sanitary and safe quarters for the accommodation of the men compelled to spend the major portion of their time therein.

Aside from the legal standpoint which makes, (according to my understanding of the law), each and every member of that Honorable Body, as well as the individual fire commissioners, responsible in the event of an accident, it is hardly conceivable that a man, because he is employed by the City of Ann Arbor, should by virtue of that fact, be compelled to abide in a place that in my estimation is unfit to house anything human. It is insanitary, unsafe, and has been condemned, and were such a condition brought to the Council's attention on the part of any other party, that Honorable Body would be righteously indignant if the employer were not to remedy the evil when his attention has been called to the condition and undoubtedly the offender would be dealt with as the law designates. Why then, should

not the Members of Council enable the Fire Commissioners to put a stop to a proceeding that this body would not countenance for one week from any other citizen?

Upwards of six months ago a communication was forwarded to the Council calling attention to the insanitary sewer conditions prevailing in the Number 1 station, or properly, the entire lack of sewer connections in this house.

This condition has likewise been entirely neglected, despite the fact that attention has been called to same. Were a private citizen to commit a similar offense, recourse would be had to the law to prevent its continuance in order to protect the health of the community, but no effort has been made to protect the health of the firemen.

The prospects for immediate relief from this condition, appear very remote and I cannot conscientiously remain a party to such treatment accorded employees in a department over which I am presumed to have a share in the supervision and for this reason I solicit the early acceptance of my resignation.

To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your ordinance committee, to whom was referred the communication of Mr. M. J. Cavanaugh as representing the D. J. & C. R. R. with reference to a change of time from Central to Eastern Standard, begs to report that the committee has taken the matter under consideration, but that as there seems to be no general demand for the change, and as the inconvenience and confusion which would arise from the

change would undoubtedly be greater than that experienced on the present basis, we deem it inadvisable to make any change at this time, and recommend that Central Standard time be continued for the present.

Street Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your Street committee have had the following matters under consideration and recommend:

1. That the width of the East Catherine st. roadway between Division and States sts. be established at 30 feet.

2. That the City Attorney prepare necessary resolutions for the opening of Edwin st.

3. That the Board of Public Works prepare plans and specifications for the extension of storm water sewer on West Madison st. from First to Third sts. and present same with approximate estimate of the cost to the council at earliest convenience.

4. That the Engineer place two inlets for storm water on West Summit st. between Main st. and the Ann Arbor railroad.

5. That the taking care of the storm water at the corner of Brooklyn and Packard sts. be referred to the City Engineer and Street Commissioner, with power to act.

6. That the curb on the north side of Cambridge road, just west of Lincoln ave., run parallel to south line of Cambridge road rather than the north line.

7. That Depot st. be graveled under the direction of the Street Commissioner.

8. That the recommendation of the Board of Public Works that no pavement be laid on any street which has not had all water, gas, sewer and other underground mains and connections completed in the condition in which they are to remain under the pavement at least six months previous to the commencing of paving work, not now ordered, be adopted.

9. That the petition of Misses Alice and Ida Allen and others, asking that they be given permission to place a preparation of calcium chloride in the street in front of their residences as a dust preventative, be granted, with the understanding that

the property owners are to pay for preparing the street as well as furnishing and applying the calcium chloride.

10. That petitions for oiling streets be granted under conditions in following resolutions:

Whereas, the Common Council has been petitioned by property owners requesting that permission be given them to oil the streets in front of their premises in order to lay the dust, and

Whereas, said petitioners have requested that the City cause the streets to be placed in condition to receive the oil, and

Whereas, this body has no power at the present time to expend money in causing the said streets to be placed in proper condition for oiling, as requested by the said petitioners, be it

Resolved, that said petitioners be granted the right to oil the streets in front of their premises, providing, and upon the condition that they pay, or cause to be paid, all expense in connection with the oiling and preparing said streets for oiling, and provided further that said petitioners shall pay any and all damages caused by said oiling, and will save the city harmless for and on account of the said oiling.
