Minutes of previous meeting approved.

From Board of Public Works.

Resolution of the Council, instructing Board to advertise for bids for construction of Broadway bridge, was taken from the table. Moved by Mr. Rehberg, that the matter be referred back to the Council, to pass through regular proceeding. Adopted by Board.

(Council action).

Moved by Ald. Sherk, that the Board of Public Works furnish the Council at their next meeting with plans and specifications and estimates of cost of a concrete bridge to be placed over the Huron river on Broadway.

Ann Arbor, Mich., July 5, 1916.

To the Board of Public Works, Ann Arbor, Michigan: Sirs—I submit herewith plans and specifications for installing a heating plant in Fire Station No. 1. I would estimate the cost of same to be about \$2,500.00. Respectfully submitted, Manley Osgood, City Engineer.

Moved by Mr. Reule, that the plans and specifications be accepted and referred to Council. Not adopted. Moved by Mr. Rehberg, that the plans and specifications for installing heating system in Fire Station No. 1, with boiler plant to be in basement of City Hall, and heat both buildings, as submitted to the Board by the City Engineer on May 3rd, 1916, be approved and recommended to the Council on account of the large saving in expense. Adopted by Board.

Mr. John C. Fischer, Hon. Wm. L. Waltz and Rev. Lloyd C. Douglas, representing the Citizens committee for Soldiers' Relief fund, explained to the Council the need of money for relief of families of soldiers, and re-

requested that the Council appropriate \$500.00 to the relief fund, and appoint a committee of two to act with the Citizens' committee.

Moved by Ald. Geo. Lutz, that the City Clerk be authorized to draw a warrant for \$500.00 on the Entertainment fund in favor of the Citizens' committee for Soldiers' Relief fund, and that the chair appoint a committee of two to act with said committee.

Mr. J. J. Goodyear appeared before the Council and announced that the fountain donated to the City by the Humane Society had arrived. He requested to know what had been done in the matter of the \$1,000.00 bequeathed to the City for fountain by the late Hon. Francis M. Hamilton.

Sidewalk Committee Report.

To the Honorable, the Common

Council: Gentlemen—Your Sidewalk committee respectfully recommends that the following sidewalks be ordered built and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, that the grading and construction of the sidewalks hereinafter mentioned is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered that stone or cement sidewalks be graded, built and constructed in the city of Ann Arbor as follows:

New Sidewalks—

928 East Ann st., 1000 East Ann st., lot east of No. 1,000 East Ann st. to No. 1016 East Ann st., lot next south of No. 1130 Forest ave., 837 East University ave., 841 East University ave., East University ave. side of No. 1105 Oakland ave., N. E. cor. Oakland and East University ave. on East University ave., 812 Monroe st. (except 6 ft. driveway east of No. 812), 910 Greenwood, 916 Greenwood, 920 Greenwood, 931 Greenwood, 932 Greenwood, 935 Greenwood, 832 Packard, 902 Packard, 904 Packard, Packard street side, No. 1220 East University ave., 1119 Packard, 720 South University ave.; also Thayer street side of same property; Thayer street side, No. 802 South University ave., south side W. Liberty from First st. east, front Dieterle property, Fifth street side of No 621 West Jefferson street.

That petition be granted and new sidewalks ordered built on south side Lincoln st., from Main st. to Fourth ave.

That new sidewalks be ordered on west side 9th st. from Huron to Washington st, and that the walk be laid so that the inside line of the sidewalk is 3 feet east of the property line.

Request Park Board to have trees killed in front of lot next south of No. 1130 Forest ave., as city has or-

dered new sidewalks laid at this point.

City Attorney's Report on Meyer Claim.

Ann Arbor, Mich., July 17th, 1915.

To the Honorable the Common Council, city of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen—The claim of Charles F. Meyer for damages to his automobile claimed to have been caused by having the same mired on State street near Dewey ave., which said claim was referred to me by your honorable body under date of June 5th, 1916, has been carefully investigated by me, and I beg leave to report as follows:

This street had been lately dug up in order to place a sewer therein, by Tom Joyce, the sewer contractor. If this street was in a bad or dangerous condition, the contractor was to care for the same, he having executed a bond to the city of Ann Arbor to save it harmless in such instances. This bond was signed by the Chicago Bonding & Surety Company of Chicago. While the amount claimed is small, I nevertheless do not feel that the claim should be allowed unless it is first allowed by the Bonding Company. In making this recommendation I wish to have it understood that I am not taking advantage of Mr. Meyer, and recommending that the

claim should not be paid because of the fact that he says in his communication that he will not sue if city does not pay his claim.

The liability should be fixed so that the city could in turn collect from the contractor or the bonding company.
