

Council Chamber, Ann Arbor, Mich., October 2, 1916. Regular session.

Meeting called to order by the president. Present: Ald. Heusel, A. Lutz, Mayer, Heck, Donnelly, Sherk, Freeman, McGregor, Sink, Geo. Lutz, Pres. Wurster, 11. Absent: Ald. Fiegel, Andres, Flynn, Manwaring, 4. Minutes of previous meeting approved.

From Board of Public Works.

Proposals for the construction of lateral sewers in Districts Nos. 75 and 81, and storm water sewer on Arch st., were received from Wm. Eddy & Son and Hochrein & Co., as follows: Eddy & Son, Arch st., storm sewer, \$663.60; sewer district No. 81, \$403.20; sewer district No. 75, \$2,324.90. Hochrein & Co., Arch st., storm sewer, \$726.25; sewer district No. 81, \$475.10; sewer district No. 75, \$3,256.35.

Moved by Mr. Scott, that inasmuch as Wm. Eddy & Son are the lowest bidders for construction of lateral sewers in Districts Nos. 75 and 81, and storm sewer on Arch st., the Board recommends to the Council that they be awarded the contracts for said sewers. Adopted by Board.

From Water Works Commission.

September 29th, 1916.

"To the Honorable the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor.

"Gentlemen: Your water commission has the honor to submit for your consideration the following information regarding the water supply and water distribution of the city:

"On January 1, 1912, there were reported to be connected to the system of the Ann Arbor Water company, 3,684 services, and at the present time there are on the city's books, 4,374 water consumers, 911 taps having been added to the system since its acquisition by the city. This addition is more than 25 percent of the total number of consumers on the water company's books when the plant was acquired by the city, and is probably the best evidence of the progress of Ann Arbor. Within the past year the growth has been almost phenomenal and made up largely of citizens of means and refinement. The residences constructed during that time and now under construction, in the district adjacent to Washtenaw avenue, and between it and Geddes avenue, would make a very respectable village by themselves, to say nothing of the new buildings west of Main street, and they are occupied by a class of residents who contribute most largely to the wealth of the community and the prosperity of its merchants and artisans.

"The attractiveness of Ann Arbor as a place of residence for the citizens of Detroit has just begun to be appreciated, and additional prosperity is in store for us if the city can do its part.

"The first requirement of such a class of citizens is an abundant water supply, one from which they can obtain as much water as they feel able or incined to pay for. If this cannot be had they will go elsewhere.

"Your commissioners have since their appointment used every endeavor to provide the city with an ample and safe supply of drinking water, and realizing from past experience the necessity of delivering

larger quantities of water to the city, and also recognizing that the Huron river was the only source available from which an abundant supply could immediately be secured, they installed during the early part of 1915, at the river station, an electrically driven pump to double the station's capacity, and a liquid chlorine plant to render the river water free of dangerous germs. Your honorable body was requested, under date of November, 1915, to provide the necessary funds to connect this machinery with the eastern part of the city, and to more thoroughly purify the water that it has been necessary to furnish.

"Though bitter were the complaints of insufficient pressure and unsafe quality of supply during the periods of company ownership, the conditions the past summer, after three years of city ownership, have been immeasurably worse, so far as pressure is concerned in the southeast portion of the city. If such conditions are permitted to exist for another season, the growth and prosperity of Ann Arbor will be very seriously interfered with, and to prevent a repetition of them, steps must be taken at once.

"The immediate and ultimate requirement is an increased capacity of water mains between the reservoir, or the pumping station and the eastern part of the city. Wherever a water supply may be obtained such increased capacity is necessary. A 16-inch main is recommended for this service, to be laid from the Reservoir via Seventh, Madison and Hill streets, to the corner of Hill and Church streets, the cost of which is estimated to be approximately \$55,000 with about \$15,000 to be added for a second main between the reservoir and the pumps.

"In view of these conditions and the need of additional local distribution mains at various places in the system, and the constantly increasing cost of labor and material, your commission respectfully asks your Honorable body to authorize the laying of the above supply main and to provide the sum of \$75,000 for the said main, and extensions, the amount to be available at the earliest possible date. Your commission will be pleased to explain if desired in further detail the conditions leading to this request and the plans for the proposed construction.

"Without your honorable body's consent your commission is unable to meet the requirements of our citi-

zens, and we consider this main to be absolutely necessary, no matter where the permanent supply may come from, and its construction must be begun at once in order that it be in service by next summer.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 25, 1916.

To the President and members of the Common Council, city of Ann Arbor, Mich.: Gentlemen—I wish to give you a statement regarding the flags which are being used in Honor of Company I.

During a recent storm the large flag, which was flying at the time, caused one of the ends of the horse on which it rested on the roof of the First National Bank building, to tip up and it was thought this might cause damage to the coping. Since then, however, another support has been added and braces have been added which will prevent a like occurrence.

Mr. D. C. Goodspeed has been very kind in permitting the cable to pass over and rest upon his building. He, however, feels that he cannot permit the flag to fly until he is given the assurance, in writing, from the council that should an accident occur in connection with the cable he will be in no way responsible. I feel sure you can readily appreciate his attitude. He is a disinterested party and protection such as he asks should be readily forthcoming. This matter should receive your immediate consideration.

As custodian of the flag I have

found it necessary to have certain repairs made on the flags, the purchase of a safety belt, etc., has been a necessity. I should appreciate it if you would appropriate fifty dollars from the contingent fund to meet these and possible other expenses. This I feel sure will cover the general expense until the boys return. The item of storm flag, amounting to about thirty-three dollars I have not met.

At my request your City Engineer went over the cable proposition with me and will be able to give you a clear statement as to the safety of the cable.
