Minutes of regular meeting, May 21, 1917 and special meeting May 29, 1917, approved.

(From Board of Public Works)

Sealed proposals for construction of sidewalks were received as follows:

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 23, 1917.

To the Board of Public Works: Gentlemen—My bid on city sidewalks for this summer is 12c per square foot, and 15c for driveways and extensions, and for reinforced concrete 45c per square foot.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 23, 1917.

To the Hon. Board of Public Works: Gentlemen—The undersigned agrees to furnish labor and material to build cement sidewalks ordered by the Council and the Board of Public Works during the year 1917 as follows:

Cement sidewalk, 4in. thick, laid according to the city standard specifications for 12c per square ft.

Cement sidewalk, 6in. thick at driveways, with cement buffers on each side, according to the city standard specifications for 15c per sq. ft.

Cement sidewalks over vaults or area-ways, when ordered and required by the Board, with reinforced concrete, for 40c per sq. ft.

We also agree that all walks ordered by the Council and Board of Public Works during the year 1916 and not built during last fall, will be laid by us during the present season, as ordered by the Board of Public Works and the Street commissioner, under out 1916 contract and at the prices per square foot for last year's cement sidewalk work.

### Communication From Charter Commission.

Whereas, the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor is prepared to submit to the people a proposed bond issue for an incinerator plant, and

Whereas, the same cannot be legally submitted to the people before June 21st,

Therefore be it resolved, that in the interest of economy, the action by which the date of the charter election was fixed for June 12th, be reconsidered, and that said charter be submitted to the people for acceptance or rejection at a special election to be held Monday, June 25th, 1917, and

Be it further resolved that the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor be notified of this action and requested to hold both elections on that date.

At a meeting of the Charter Commission, held at five o'clock Thursday, May 31, 1917, the above resolution was unanimously adopted.

By Ald. Freeman: Whereas, at the General City Election, held under date of April 3, 1916, the proposition of a general revision of the Charter of Ann Arbor, received a majority of the votes cast at said election, in favor of said revision, and

Whereas, at said election eleven (11) commissioners were duly and legally elected to revise said charter, and

Whereas, said commissioners have prepared a proposed charter for said city and now have the same ready

for submission to the electors of said city for their approval. Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that a special election be and is hereby called to be held on the 25th day of June, 1917 for the purpose of submitting the proposition of adopting the proposed charter to the qualified electors of said city.

Resolved, further, that the polls be held in the following places: First ward, voting room in basement of City hall; Second ward, ward building on South Ashley st.; Third ward, ward building on Miller ave.; Fourth ward, voting room in basement of New Armory on Fifth ave.; Fifth ward, ward building on corner of Swift and Pontiac sts.; Sixth ward, basement of Tappan school on East University ave.; Seventh ward, ward building on Mary st.

Resolved, further, that the polls shall be open at 7 o'clock a. m. and remain open until 8 o'clock p. m., and the Supervisors and Aldermen shall act as Election Inspectors, according to the charter of the City of Ann Arbor.

Resolved, further, that the ballot shall be of white paper of equal length and width and shall read:

Shall the revised charter be adopted? Yes ( ).

Shall the revised charter be adopted? No ( ).

Resolved, further, that the canvass and determination of said vote be made according to the state law and city charter.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk of the said city is hereby authorized to issue the usual call for said special election, pursuant to the state law and charter of the city, and cause to be printed ballots as above provided for the use of the electors at said election.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk make all the necessary arrangements for the registration of voters, at the usual voting rooms in each ward of the city of Ann Arbor for Wednesday, June 20th, 1917, according to the state law and city charter.

Adopted by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Heusel, Sugden, Mayer, Huss, Andres, Henderson, Donnelly, Markey, Sherk, Hauser, McGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Sink, Pres. Reichert, 15. Nays, none.

The original resolution, as amended, was presented as follows:

By Ald. Lutz: Whereas, the city of Ann Arbor has been notified by the authorities of the Township of Ann Arbor that after the 1st day of September 1917 the City will not be permitted to dispose of its garbage in said township, and

Whereas, Act number 539 of the Local Acts of Michigan for the year of 1905, entitled "An act to authorize and enable the City of Ann Arbor to build, construct and install a garbage crematory or plant, to purchase land, machinery and appurtenances therefor and to raise the money for such purpose by tax or loan," authorizes the City of Ann Arbor to raise a sum not to exceed ten thousand dollars, and

Whereas, this body is of the opinion that the city should at once construct a garbage crematory or disposal plant, now, therefore it is hereby

Resolved, that a special election be and the same is hereby called to be held under date of June 25, 1917, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the city of Ann Arbor the proposition of raising by loan the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars said sum when raised to be used for the purpose of constructing a garbage disposal plant or crematory.

Resolved, further, that the polls be held in the following places:

First ward, voting room basement of City Hall; Second ward, ward building on S. Ashley st.; Third ward, ward building on Miller ave.; Fourth ward, voting room basement of New Armory on Fifth ave.; Fifth ward, ward building on corner of Swift and Pontiac sts.; Sixth ward, voting room basement of Tappan school on East University ave.; Seventh ward, ward building on Mary st.

Resolved further, that the polls shall be open at 7 o'clock a. m. and

remain open until 8 o'clock p. m. and that the Supervisors and Aldermen act as Election Inspectors, according to the charter of the City of Ann Arbor.

Resolved, further, that the ballots shall be of white paper of equal width and length and shall read:

For the garbage crematory or plant loan Yes ( )

For the garbage crematory or plant loan No ( )

Resolved, further, that the canvass and determination of said vote be made according to the State Law and Charter of the city.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk is hereby authorized to issue the usual call for said special election, pursuant to the state law and charter of the City of Ann Arbor, and cause to be printed ballots as above provided, for the use of the electors at said election.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk make all necessary arrangements for the registration of voters, both men and women, at the usual voting rooms in each ward of the City on Wednesday June 20th, 1917 according to the state law and City charter.
