City Engineer presented tabulation of bids received August 17, 1917, on ten ton road roller with scarifier, f. o. b. Ann Arbor, as follows:

Buffalo Springfield Roller Co., Kelly Springfield two cylinder motor \$3,950.00; double cylinder steam locomotive type boiler, \$3,850.00; double cylinder steam, Pitts boiler locomotive style \$3,850.00; allowance for old roller, \$300.00.

Austin-Western Road Machinery Co., Austin motor single cylinder \$3,750.00; double cylinder \$4,300.00; allowance for old roller, \$750.00.

Good Roads Machinery Co., two cylinder steam \$3,450.00; allowance for old roller, \$500.00.
