Ald. Lutz made oral report that the Finance committee, to whom was referred the recommendation of the Board of Public Works, and bids for changes at Fire station No. 1, had considered the matter, and recommended that the Board of Public Works and Fire committee make only necessary repairs, not to exceed \$600.00 appropriated for said purpose. Adopted.

#### Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Sink presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to regulate and control the selling of milk within the City of Ann Arbor, and to license the vendors thereof, and to regulate the care of cows, from which milk is sold, and for the inspection and examination of dairies and dairy herds and milk, passed March 14, 1904, approved March 22nd, 1904; amended April 18th, 1904; amended January 4th, 1915.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. That section twelve of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to regulate and control the selling of milk within the City of Ann Arbor, and to license the vendors thereof, and to regulate the care of cows, from which milk is sold, and for the inspection and examination of dairies and dairy herds and milk," passed March 14th, 1904; approved March 22d, 1904; amended January 4th, 1915, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 12. All receptacles from which or in which milk is sold or delivered by any dealer or person shall be thoroughly scalded before being used as such receptacle, and the use of faucet tanks or cans are hereby prohibited.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Sugden, Mayer, Huss, Henderson, Donnelly, Markey, Sherk, Hauser, McGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Sink, Pres. Reichert, 13. Nays, none.

Ald. Sink presented "An ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance relative to licenses," passed July 6, 1891; approved July 15, 1891; amended Feb. 4, 1895; amended March 16, 1896; amended Dec. 19, 1898; amended June 4, 1900; amended Nov. 6, 1905; amended June 17, 1907; amended Jan. 6, 1908.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain: which was given its first reading by title, passed to and given its second reading and referred to ordinance committee by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Sugden, Mayer, Huss, Henderson, Donnelly, Markey, Sherk, Hauser, McGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Sink, Pres. Reichert, 13. Nays, none.

To the Hon. the Common Council, City of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen—We, your Ordinance committee, have prepared an amendment to an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance relative to Porters, Runners, and Drivers and to regulate Hacks and Drays," to provide for the charges which could be made by taxicab owners for the carriage of passengers, and would have submitted the said amendment for its second reading to-night had it not been for the fact that the taxicab companies of the city have attempted to take this matter into their own hands and ignore this body, as well as attempt to ignore the provisions of the present ordinance. For this reason we feel that the present ordinance is not adequate to take care of present conditions, and we are therefore drafting an entirely new ordinance to cover hacks and taxicabs, and dealing with them alone.

Attached hereto is a copy of the letter which was received by your committee from the taxicab companies, and we feel certain that upon reading this letter the members of this body will feel that we are pursuing the proper course.

Honorable Councilman, C. A. Sink, Chairman of the Ordinance Committee, 719 S. Thayer st., Ann Arbor, Mich.: In speaking in behalf of the Taxicab Companies, must express that it is our desire to co-operate with the

City of Ann Arbor to amend an ordinance which is fair to all. On account of the litigation, which we now expect will be of some duration, we feel that to protect ourselves and the taxicab service of Ann Arbor, it will be impossible to wait until this ordinance is passed, and to maintain ourselves until this time, it is necessary that the new rates become effective on and after Monday, November 12th, 1917. We also state we are willing to meet the ordinance committee at all times to thoroughly discuss this question and feel reasonably assured that we can come to a satisfactory agreement to all.

#### **Sewer Boundary.**

By Ald. Sherk: Resolved, that each and all of the lands, tenements and premises hereinafter mentioned, are deemed and declared to be benefitted

by the construction of lateral sewer No. 84, to the extent of the cost thereof, street crossings excepted, and all such lands shall constitute and all of the said lands hereinafter mentioned is fixed and determined as the district and special district upon and against which shall be assessed and charged all the costs and expenses of construction of such lateral sewer, that is to say:

All of the lots in Killins Height's Addition to the City of Ann Arbor, except lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 63, 64, 65, 88, 89, 118, 119, 120, 121, 122, 150, 151 and 152.

Revised boundary to take the place of that adopted by the Common Council on August 20, 1917.

Resolved, further, that this resolution, order and determination be and the same is hereby certified to the City Assessor.

#### **Lighting Committee.**

To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Lighting committee has had the following matters under consideration, and respectfully recommends:

That arc light be placed at intersection of State st. and Granger ave., and that tungsten lights be placed as follows. On the west side of Fourth st., between Jefferson and William sts. one-half way between Nos. 430 and 436; on south side of Packard st., 15 ft. east of fire hydrant on lawn extension in front of Perry school; on the west side of S. Fifth ave., 6 ft. north of driveway of No. 544; on the north side of Granger ave., at intersection of Golden ave., on the south side of Geddes ave., at intersection of Camden court on Edison Co.'s pole.

That petitions for lights at following locations be not granted; corner Elm st. and Mack road, and on the easterly side of Detroit st., north of White Swan laundry.

Your committee has favorably considered the petition of G. H. Wild, et al., relative to boulevard lighting system in State st. district, but on account of the matter of expense we recommend that the matter be referred to the Lighting and Finance committees, for further consideration.

#### Board of Review on Sidewalks.

To the Common Council: Gentlemen—The undersigned, City Clerk, begs leave to submit the following as the proceedings of the Board of Review, having under consideration the several sidewalks constructed by the Board of Public Works in the City of Ann Arbor, at the expense of the building sidewalk fund.

The Council sitting as such Board of Review, in pursuance to its order and appointment for the purpose, met at the Council Chamber on Monday, November 19, 1917, at seven o'clock p. m., and due proof of publication of the notice of the meeting filed. The roll call of the aldermen being called and a quorum being present as follows: Ald. Sugden, Mayer, Huss, Henderson, Donnelly, Markey, Hauser, McGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Sink, 11.

The certificate of the Board of Public Works being presented the Council entered upon the consideration of same.

To the Common Council, from the Board of Public Works: Gentlemen—We submit to your honorable body the report of all sidewalks built by this board, and charged to the property owners, as per your order. The amount placed after each description being the actual cost of the walk, with ten per cent added, this being the amount which is a lien upon the property, as per section 13 of an ordinance relative to sidewalks.

Sidewalks built by city, cost of same and ten per cent added to be assessed against the property along which said walks have been constructed.

**City Attorney's Report.**

To the Hon. The Common Council, City of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen—In Re: Frank Krawz vs. City of Ann Ar-

bor. Having learned that the above entitled claim was to be presented to the Council at this meeting, I made an investigation of the same in company with Mr. Bassett, superintendent of parks, and I therefore desire to report at this time so that the matter

may be closed as far as the city is concerned. We found that Mr. Krawz had driven his machine upon the lawn extension at the point where he ran into the limb of the tree. The inside wheel tracks of his automobile were within three feet of the outer edge of the sidewalk, and the wheel tracks on the left hand side of his machine showed them to be inside the gutter box and entirely upon the lawn extension. Had Mr. Krawz remained in the street proper, even if he had driven over as far as the gutter box, it would have been impossible for him to drive into the limb of the tree which damaged his automobile, as at the time that Mr. Bassett and myself made the investigation we backed the park department car down into the gutter, and found that the limbs was fully two feet above the top of the automobile.

In my opinion, no liability attaches to the city in any manner whatever, and I would therefore recommend that the claim be disallowed.
