Fire Protection—Ann Arbor.

Mich. Inspection Bureau, Detroit,
Mich., Feb. 28, 1919.

Honorable Mayor and Council, Ann Arbor, Mich.: Gentlemen—Our engineer, Mr. C. W. Moore, made a complete re-inspection of the fire fighting facilities of your city last week, and found that you had made many improvements in the protection since our last report dated December, 1913, and that these improvements had been made along the lines as suggested by us in that report.

We take pleasure in advising you that we have graded your present protection, and found it to be in the 3½ class. The classification upon which present fire insurance rates are

based in your city is 4th class. We find that the only improvement which keeps the protection out of 3rd class is the matter of a telegraph fire alarm system, and we understand that tentative plans are under way for this installation.

Our rating department had planned to make a complete reinspection of your city in the near future, and it is our earnest desire that you obtain the best possible classification before this work is taken up. We would therefore advise that if your Honorable Body will give us official assurance that the following recommendation will be complied with during the coming year, and that an up-to-date system will be in complete operation at the earliest possible moment, we will advise our rating department of a 3rd class grading, and apply our rates accordingly. Our recommendation is that: In addition to the present fire alarm arrangements, install and maintain a suitable automatic telegraph fire alarm system following the requirements of the National Board of Fire Underwriters. For the reasons stated above it is our earnest desire that we obtain early action on the above recommendation.

To the Mayor and Common Council,
City of Ann Arbor, Mich.: Gentlemen—On January 20th, we sent you a communication offering to pay six hundred dollars (\$600.00) towards the paving of Broadway, between the Broadway bridge and the Michigan Central tracks, our understanding being at that time that our proportion of the tax would be less than half that amount. We understand now that the amount which we offered is only slightly in excess of our share of the tax, and as the benefits of this pavement are of some importance to us, we beg to make you the following amended proposition:

By Ald. Heusel: Resolved, that Section 186 of the Charter of the City of Ann Arbor, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 186. No bond, note or other obligation or evidence of indebtedness of said corporation, except orders on the treasurer, as hereinafter provided, and also except bonds for sewerage and paving purposes, shall ever be given or issued by said corporation, or by any officer thereof, in his official capacity, whereby the said city shall become obligated to pay any money, unless the same shall have been duly authorized by the legislature of this state, and shall have been submitted to and voted for by a majority of the electors of said city voting thereon, in conformity to this act; but the Common Council may allow just claims against the city, and may issue orders therefor on the Treasurer, or payable on presentation from any moneys then in the treasury, on the first day of February thereafter; but such second named class of orders shall not, in any fiscal year, exceed the aggregate taxes levied in such year for the payment of the same. All moneys collected for the use of the city shall be paid into the city treasury, and no moneys shall be paid from the treasury unless it shall have been previously appropriated by the Common Council to the purpose for which it shall be drawn. The Treasurer shall pay out no money except upon the written warrant of the Mayor and City Clerk, which warrant shall specify the fund from which the money is to be paid; provided, that school moneys shall be paid to the treasury of school district number one of the City of Ann Arbor upon the warrant of the President and Secretary of said board. The Common Council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution duly adopted by a majority of all the mem-

bers elect, authorize the issuing of bonds to the amount not exceeding three hundred thousand dollars outstanding at any one time, for the purpose of paving any alley, street or streets in such city, such bonds to run for a period not exceeding ten years from the date of their issue, and at a rate of interest not exceeding five percent per annum, and the Common Council for the purpose of carrying out this provision may pass such ordinance or ordinances as may be deemed necessary.

By Ald. Heusel: Resolved, that Section 3 of an act entitled, "An Act to authorize and empower and enable the city of Ann Arbor to construct and maintain a system of sewers, and to raise the necessary money therefor, and to legalize the proceedings and acts of the Common Council and officers of the city of Ann Arbor had by virtue of act number four hundred thirteen of the local acts of eighteen hundred ninety-three," which act was passed by the legislature of the State of Michigan in the year eighteen hundred ninety-five, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 3. The Common Council of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to raise by loan on the taxable property of said city a sufficient sum of money for a period of not longer than five years and at a rate of interest not greater than five per cent., for the purpose of enabling said city to construct and maintain said sewer system; provided, that not more than eighty thousand dollars of such bonded indebtedness shall be outstanding at any one time.

Whereas, the cost of constructing said pumping station and pipe line has exceeded the said sum of two

hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00), and

Whereas, the additional funds necessary for the completion of said pumping station and pipe line has been estimated at the sum of forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000.00), and
