To the Mayor and Council: Your Special committee to which was referred the drafting of a suitable resolution concerning a new schedule of water rates based upon a fully metered condition in the city, respectfully recommends the following:

Be it resolved, that if the proposed \$75,000.00 bond issue for meters is approved at the coming city election it will be the desire and purpose of the Council to secure the adoption and operation of a new schedule of water rates which shall include the following features, namely:

(1) A minimum charge of 50 cents a month to each consumer, with an allowance of 50 cents worth of water

under this minimum, instead of the "service charge" of 50 cents a month as previously discussed.

(2) A quantity schedule with a rate for small consumers not higher than the present meter rate of 20 cents a thousand gallons, and as much lower than this figure as operating conditions may be found to permit.

(3) A fair and equitable distribution of the total burden of the water plant among domestic, commercial, industrial, and other classes of water users and among individual consumers of the same class.

(4) A total income from operation equal to the actual cost of financially supporting the water plant plus 10 per centum of such cost to provide for ordinary extensions; and a revision of rate schedules whenever necessary to hold the total income approximately at this point.
