#### Mayor's Message.

To the Honorable, the Common Council, City of Ann Arbor:

"Gentlemen: You and I have been given the privilege of serving people and as most of you have served through a period in which it was necessary to conduct our city affairs under war time conditions, we are now to readjust Ann Arbor to the needs of peace. This no one individual or executive can accomplish alone, but as partners, and with a full hearted co-operation of all city departments much may be expected.

"As trustees of the city's finances it is our duty to safeguard the city's funds in every possible way, but it would be unwise if we were to be penurious or 'penny wise and pound foolish.' If I understand our people correctly, they want all the modern conveniences and improvements which we can reasonably give them and each citizen is willing to pay his just share therefor, providing that the money is not wasted or that such improvements are not of a selfish nature. We must bear in mind that Ann Arbor can not acquire the things other cities have and boast of unless we are willing to be assessed and pay for them.

"We are living through an unusual period of time; prices of both material and labor have advanced with leaps and bounds, making the individual cost of living much higher, and likewise the expense of maintaining our city has increased in like proportions. You have from time to time advanced and equalized the pay of city employes to meet this very condition, present high cost of living. One must not lose sight of the fact that the city cannot hope to have an efficient organization of employes unless it pays on a fair basis with the employes of private enterprise or corporation. The waste incurred by inefficient and indifferent workmen is not an economy. However, employes must be willing to give the same class of service to the city that the private employe gives his employer. There must be no sinecures.

"Many suggestions, as to the needs

of our city, might be offered in this message, but I feel that you are as familiar as I with the problems and conditions confronting us, and as many more may arise, I therefore prefer to present those matters from time to time as I may feel they are called for.

"As before stated we are to readjust to times of peace and in so doing let us consider most seriously, along with the necessities, the comforts and happiness of our people. Perhaps that which is entitled to your immediate attention is the dust nuisance. I fully realize that this is a difficult problem to handle but I also feel that the present method of creating oiling districts and the very limited sprinkling districts created by individuals through private contract are very unsatisfactory, complicated and slow to produce results. I also trust that you may lend consideration to recreation and entertainment for both young and old, aid the supporters of a community house, see that clean and wholesome amusements, of all nature, are offered the community, for with all this, living in Ann Arbor surely will be worth while.

"With the authorized improvements of the water works department well under way and the necessary funds voted for its completion, and the funds having been provided for the installation of water meters, Ann Arbor should soon be supplied with water equaled by few other cities.

"The amendments to our charter, extending our paving and sewer bonding limits which were presented to the voter at the charter election, having carried, will enable the city to undertake more extensively, work of this kind, and such improvements should be made where it will serve the greatest number. I would urge that immediate action be taken to again inform the Detroit, Jackson & Chicago Railway company to build its roadbed and rails suitable for future, as well as the present traffic on the proposed paved streets so as to not delay the construction of said paving. The paving program for 1920 also should be considered so as to enable the various service corporations to install their service lines and also to allow the city time to arrange for storm sewers on such streets.

"I cannot close without expressing to you my high appreciation for the manner in which you so loyally stood by our government during the war and having supported the many

patriotic requests which were made. This may also be said of all our good people who gave so liberally of their time and money.

"I wish to emphasize my appreciation for the hearty co-operation which you have given me in the past and which I sincerely trust will continue in the future, for the benefit of our city.

By Ald. Heusel: Whereas, this Common Council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the curbing and guttering of Oxford road, from Hill street to and including the north line of South University ave., within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor, Michigan; and

Whereas, the curbing and guttering of that part of Oxford road, within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement; therefore

Resolved, that it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause Oxford road, within the limits aforesaid, to be curbed and guttered under the charter and ordinances of the city of Ann Arbor, and in pursuance of the prayer of said petitioners.

Resolved, further, that the cost and expense of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections, engineering expenses and fifty per cent of the remaining shall be paid by the city, and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting Oxford road, within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the said petition, along with this determination, be and the same is hereby referred to

the Board of Public Works with directions to report to the Council with all convenient dispatch suitable plans with specifications for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quality of material to be used therefor, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expenses of such public improvement.

#### Sewer Committee Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Sewer committee has had the following matters under consideration, and respectfully recommends:

1. That sanitary sewer be constructed on Jones st. from Broadway to Mill st. and on Mill st. from Jones st. north about 500 feet.

2. That the City Engineer be instructed to prepare plans, specifications and estimate of cost for construction of above named sanitary sewer; also for storm water sewers as follows: On Detroit st. from Kingsley st. to Fifth ave.; on Catherine st. from Main st. to Fifth ave.;

on South University av. from Linden st. to Oxford road; on East University av. from South University av. to North University av.; and on Broadway from Huron river southwesterly about 300 feet.
