On Berkshire road and Orchard st., labor and materials, \$1,309.40; engineering, and contingencies, \$130.94; total, \$1,440.34. On East Hoover ave., labor and materials, \$767.40; engineering and contingencies, \$76.74; total, \$844.14. On Edward st., labor and materials, \$405.85; engineering and contingencies, \$40.58; total, \$446.43. On Seventh st., labor and materials, \$314.30; engineering and contingencies, \$31.43; total, \$345.73. Storm sewer on Hill st. from Church st. to East University ave., labor and materials, \$824.40; engineering and contingencies, \$82.44; total, \$906.84.

Ald. Mayer moved the adoption of report, which was adopted by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Heusel, Sugden, Mayer, Ehnis, Prochnow, Henderson, Donnelly, Ryan, Spathelf, Moore, MacGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Reichert, 14. Nays, none.

By Ald. Mayer: Whereas, the electors of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, by a vote of more than three-fifth of the votes cast at a special election held on the seventh day of April, 1919, did authorize the raising by loan of the sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00) and issuing the bonds of the City of Ann Arbor therefor, payable not more than ten years from date of issue, and bearing interest not exceeding six per cent per annum, of which sum forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000.00) to be used for the purpose of completing a certain pumping station and pipe lines now under construction in connection with the Water Works System of said City, and the balance of said sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00), being seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000.00), is to be used for the purpose of purchasing and installing water-meters in connection with said Water Works System of said City.

Now, therefor, it is hereby resolved

that the bonds of the City of Ann Arbor be issued in the sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000.00), for the purposes aforesaid: That said bonds be one hundred and twenty in number of the denomination of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) each, numbered consecutively from one to one hundred twenty: Be dated September first, 1919, and become due and payable on September first, 1929, with the right to redeem said bonds at par on September 1st, 1924, with interest thereon at five per cent, per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of September, and the first day of March, each year, as evidenced by interest coupons to be thereto attached, bearing the printed or lithographed signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk of the City of Ann Arbor, both principal and interest to be payable at the office of the City Treasurer, City Hall, Ann Arbor, Mich.

Resolved, further, that said bonds be in such form as shall be furnished by the purchaser of said bonds.

Resolved, further that the matter of the sale of said bonds be referred to the Finance committee of the Common Council, with power to act.

Adopted by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Heusel, Sugden, Mayer, Ehnis, Prochnow, Henderson, Donnelly, Ryan, Spathelf, Moore, MacGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Reichert, 14. Nays, none.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Mayer presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An ordinance, to regulate the business of, and to provide a license for those dealing in second-hand electric or motor driven vehicles and accessories, and to provide a penalty for a violation thereof.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. No person, partnership or corporation shall engage in the business of keeping a second-hand electric or motor driven vehicle or used car store or place within the City of Ann Arbor, for buying, selling, or trading, second-hand electric or motor driven vehicles or used cars, without a license from the Mayor as herein provided.

Sec. 2. The Mayor of said City is hereby authorized to grant a license to any person of good character, to engage in the business of keeping a second-hand automobile or used car store or place for the buying or tak-

ing in exchange or selling of second-hand automobiles or used cars, or parts and accessories thereto, on his paying into the City Treasury the sum of one dollar, and executing a bond to the City of Ann Arbor in the penal sum of One Thousand Dollars, and with one or more sufficient sureties to be approved by the Mayor, on condition that he will faithfully observe the provisions of the Charter of the City of Ann Arbor, and of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. No person, partnership or corporation licensed under this ordinance shall by virtue of one license keep within said City more than one house, shop or place for the buying, receiving and taking in exchange or selling second-hand automobiles or used cars, and parts and accessories thereto, of any description in any place other than his place of business.

Sec. 4. Every person, partnership or corporation so licensed shall, at the place of business named in said license, keep a book in which shall be written in ink, at the time of the purchase, or at the time of selling, of any second-hand or used automobile, or parts or accessories a description thereof, the name, age, address and personal description of the person or persons from whom such purchase was made, or to whom such sale is made; also the day and hour of such purchase or sale. Such book at all times shall be open to the inspection of the Mayor, or Chief of Police, or any member or members of the police department designated by them. Such book shall be substantially bound, and in size not less than six inches in length and breadth. No entry in such book shall be erased, obliterated, altered or defaced. Every licensed dealer shall make out a report every day before 10 a. m., of the sale made and the cars received for sale, or purchased, on a blank form to be furnished by the police department, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. Such report to give the full detail in accordance with this ordinance of all transactions the day previous, and up to the time of making such report, and said report to be filed with the Chief of Police of the City of Ann Arbor. Every such licensed dealer shall post in a conspicuous place in his place of business a copy of this ordinance relating to the dealer's license, under the provisions of this ordinance, such

copies to be furnished by the Police Department of said City.

Sec. 5. No person, partnership or corporation, under the provisions of this ordinance, shall sell or remove from his place of business any such second-hand automobiles, or used cars or parts or accessories, either in his possession for sale, or which has been sold to him as aforesaid, until the same shall have been in his possession at least ninety-six hours. Provided any dealer licensed under this act may sell and dispose of any such second-hand automobile or used cars or parts thereof, within said ninety-six hours if such dealer shall first report said automobile or parts to the police department.

Sec. 6. Any violation or failure to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars and costs. The offender may be sentenced to be imprisoned in default thereof until the payment thereof in the Washtenaw County Jail for a period not to exceed sixty days.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force ten days after legal publication.

The chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Bloom field for permission to connect with the sanitary sewer on Cross street, we beg leave to report that this matter has been under consideration, and we recommend that the petition be granted, with the understanding that all work be done under the supervision of the City Engineer, and without any cost to the city.

Ald. Prochnow submitted the following proposal from Messrs. W. C. Hoad and A. J. Decker:

This Memorandum of Agreement, by and between the City of Ann Arbor, Mich., and Hoad and Decker, Engineers, of Ann Arbor, Michigan, witnesseseth:

That the said Engineers, for the consideration hereinafter mentioned, have agreed to make all the necessary surveys and field investigations and to work out a comprehensive plan for a system of storm water drainage for the said city, within the present platted area, together with general provision for adjoining areas likely to be tributary in the future, such plan to be well suited to the local conditions and to be subject to the approval of the City Council. This plan will be put forth in a set of drawings showing large scale maps and profiles of all sewers and detailed designs for man-holes, inlets, catch basins, and other sewer appurtenances. The drawings will be on tracing linen and will become the property of the city.

And that the said City will at all times give free access to the said Engineers to all records of existing sewers, and to all records and data appertenant to the problem of storm water drainage on file in the City's offices.

And that the said City in the consideration of faithful and complete performance of the foregoing agreement has agreed to pay to the said Engineers the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00).

In witness whereof, the Mayor and Clerk of the said City and the said Engineers in person have set their hands, in duplicate, on the dates and at the places indicated opposite their signatures.
