Ordinance Committee

Ald. Mayer presented an ordinance entitled: "An Ordinance relative to a sanitary sewer on South Seventh street:

Whereas, a sanitary sewer has been constructed on South Seventh street, running north from W. Washington street a distance of approximately 146 feet, and

Whereas, most of the property adjacent to said sewer has already been assessed for sanitary sewer, and

Whereas, it would be unjust to again tax said lands for sanitary sewer and,

Whereas, this sewer is the only outlet for sewerage from the property north of the intersection of South Seventh street and West Washington street; now, therefore

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain—Which was given its first reading by title and referred back to ordinance committee by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Heu-

sel, Mayer, Ehnis, Henderson, Donnelly, Spathelf, Moore, MacGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Reichert, Pres. Lewis, 12. Nays, none.

Ald. Mayer presented the following ordinance, which was given its second and third readings:

AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO A SANITARY SEWER ON BLVD. DRIVE.

Whereas, it is proposed to build a sanitary sewer on Boulevard Drive; and

Whereas, such sanitary sewer, if constructed, will necessarily be made use of to some extent for the purpose of a main sewer, and

Whereas, the property along which it is proposed to construct said sewer is owned by the University of Michigan and would not therefore be subject to an assessment for the construction of said sewer, and

Whereas, it would be unfair to the property owners who will connect with said sewer to assess the cost of the construction of the sewer along the said University of Michigan property; now, therefore,

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. Whenever the Common Council shall deem it expedient to order the construction of a sanitary sewer on Boulevard Drive, and proceedings shall be had as provided in an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Sewers, providing for a system of Lateral and Connecting Sewers in the City of Ann Arbor," the Common Council may appropriate for the construction of said sanitary sewer such of the cost thereof as the Common Council shall deem it just for the City to pay in addition to the cost of street crossings, and may make such appropriation by suitable resolution.

Section 2. The proceedings relative to the construction of such sanitary sewer shall be in accordance with an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Sewers, Providing for the Construction of a System of Lateral and Connecting Sewers in the City of Ann Arbor, passed May 21st, 1894, approved May 23rd, 1894; amended January 3, 1899; amended August 17th, 1903; amended March 12th, 1906; amended March 18th, 1907, in all respects except as herein otherwise provided and expressed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Heusel, Mayer, Ehnis, Henderson, Donnelly, Spathelf, Moore, MacGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Reichert, Pres. Lewis, 12. Nays, none.

Ald. Mayer presented the following ordinance, which was given its third reading:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE USE OF STREETS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES;" PASSED NOVEMBER 4TH, 1895, APPROVED NOVEMBER 5TH, 1895; AMENDED JUNE 5TH, 1899; AMENDED OCTOBER 20TH, 1913.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. That section seven of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance relative to the use of streets and other Public Places," passed November 4th, 1895; approved November 5th, 1895; amended June 5th, 1899; amended October 20th, 1913, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 7. Merchants and others occupying permanent business locations shall be permitted to construct openings in the sidewalks along the front, rear or side of their locations, where the walk is of greater width than ten feet, to admit of delivery of fuel into the basement areas under said sidewalks, for the admission of light and air to said basements and areas of said store buildings, provided, that openings for the delivery of fuel, when made more than three feet from the inner line of said sidewalk, shall be not greater than thirty inches in diameter, be circular in form, and be effectually closed when not in actual use by an iron cover, set flush with the surface of the sidewalk, level therewith, and securely locked in place. All openings in the sidewalks shall be closed and protected either by substantial iron grating or illuminated pavement so placed as to be flush with the surface of the sidewalk, and level therewith. said merchants and others shall also be permitted to suspend movable awnings from the front, rear or side of their respective places of business so that the said awnings, when lowered extend out into the street for any convenient distance not to exceed 10 feet: Provided that no such awning shall be so suspended that any part or attachment thereof shall ever be less than seven feet, in a vertical line, above the surface of the sidewalk. No person, firm or corporation shall be hereafter permitted

to construct a permanent awning, portico, or covered approach to any building or place of business in the city, of iron or other material, that shall extend into the street for a greater distance than ten feet: Provided, that no such permanent awning, portico, or covered approach shall be so constructed or suspended that any portion of the same shall be less than ten feet, in a vertical line, above the surface of the sidewalk, and the same shall not, in any manner, rest upon the surface of the sidewalk or curbing.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed by the following vote: Yeas. Ald. Heusel, Mayer, Ehnis, Henderson, Donnelly, Spathef, Moore, MacGregor, Freeman, Lutz, Reichert. Pres. Lewis, 12. Nays, none.

Ald. Mayer presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND CONTROL THE DRIVING OF AUTOMOBILES, MOTOR VEHICLES AND OTHER VEHICLES WITHIN THE CITY OF ANN ARBOR," PASSED AUGUST 21ST, 1911; APPROVED AUGUST 23RD, 1911; AMENDED NOVEMBER 15TH, 1915.

The Common council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That sections two and three of an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance to regulate and control the Driving of Automobiles, Motor Vehicles and other Vehicles, within the City of Ann Arbor;" passed August 21st, 1911; approved August 23rd, 1911; amended November 15th, 1915, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2. The owner, operator, driver or person in charge of any cart, dray, wagon, hackney coach, omnibus, automobile, motor cycle, motor vehicle, carriage or other vehicle, except street cars, used, propelled or driven upon any street, alley or public place of the corporation shall conform to and observe the following rules of the road:

1. All vehicles shall be driven in a careful manner, and with due re-

gard for the safety and convenience of other vehicles and of pedestrians.

2. Every vehicle shall keep on the right side of the road or street, except when necessary to turn to the left in crossing or in overtaking another vehicle.

3. Vehicles going in opposite directions shall pass each other on the right.

4. Every vehicle overtaking another vehicle shall keep to the left of the overtaken vehicle in passing.

5. Vehicles turning to the left into another street, shall pass to the right of and beyond the center of street intersection before turning, and in congested districts where traffic policemen are stationed at street intersections, an approaching automobile or vehicle must signal such officer and not enter such intersection until receiving proper signal from said officer.

6. No vehicle shall be driven through a procession, except with the permission of a police officer.

7. Every driver of a vehicle, when such vehicle is approaching a street car stopping for the purpose of taking on or discharging passengers, shall give some signal plainly visible or audible to such passenger, and shall keep such vehicle at least six feet from the running board or lower step of such car; and, if either by reason of the presence of vehicles at the place where such car is stopping, or by reason of the narrowness of the street, is not possible to preserve such distance of six feet from such running board or lower step, the driver of said vehicle shall stop the same until such car shall have taken on or discharged its passengers and again started. Provided that a portion of each street hereinafter named where the street cars are required to stop to receive or discharge passengers described as a strip of the street six feet in width lying outside and adjacent to and parallel with the outer car rail and running from the hither lot line sixty feet from the street intersection shall be deemed a safety zone and it shall be a violation of the provisions of this ordinance to drive into said safety zones while persons are waiting for passage on any street car or alighting therefrom. The above mentioned safety zones shall be established at the following places: At the corner of Main and Huron streets, corner of Main and Washington streets, corner of Liberty and

Main streets, corner of Main and William streets, and at the corner of William and State street and such other places as the Common Council may from time to time by resolution designate.

8. No vehicle shall stand or stop within any street intersection so as to obstruct the free passage of vehicles and pedestrians.

9. No vehicle shall stop at any cross walk or sidewalk in such manner as to obstruct the free passage of pedestrians on such crosswalks or sidewalk, or for a longer period than is necessary to permit persons to alight from or to enter said vehicle.

10. No vehicle shall stop on any street, except within two feet of the curb, or in any such way as to obstruct free passage on the street, provided that this rule shall not apply when a driver of a vehicle is compelled to stop by reason of rule 7 of this section.

11. No vehicle shall cross any thoroughfare or make any turn thereon at a greater speed than ten miles per hour.

12. Automobiles crossing any thoroughfare shall signal approaching vehicles and the vehicle nearest the approaching street intersection shall have the right of way wherever a traffic officer is not stationed; otherwise rule 5 must be strictly observed.

13. Vehicles moving slowly shall keep as near as may be convenient to the curb on the right side, allowing more swiftly moving vehicles free passage on their left.

14. Drivers of motor vehicles before turning, stopping or changing their course, shall make sure that such movement can be made with safety.

15. Vehicles crossing from one side of the street to the other in the congested district, shall do so by turning to the left so as to head in the same direction as the traffic on the side of the street toward which the crossing is made.

16. No vehicle shall stop in the congested district with its left side to the curb, and no automobile shall stop anywhere in the city with its left side to the curb.

17. No vehicle shall remain backed up to the curb in the congested district unless it is actually loading or unloading, and in such case no longer than the actual loading or unloading requires.

18. All automobiles shall carry the proper number of lamps, and shall during the period from one hour af-

ter sunset to one hour before sunrise display the number and kinds of lights required by state law. Automobile drivers may aid themselves in this rule by observing the general rule of lighting street lamps.

19. Automobiles leaving any public garage or alley, must stop before crossing the sidewalk line and give proper signal, and the utmost care shall be used in entering same. Signals in such cases may be used freely.

20. The horse or horses attached to a vehicle backed up to the curb in the congested district shall be turned at right angles to the vehicle and in the direction which the traffic upon that side of the street is moving.

21. No person while under the influence of liquor shall drive any kind of a vehicle upon the streets, highways, or public places of the city.

22. The Chief of Police may, from time to time, prohibit or regulate the parking of motor vehicles or other vehicles in any district where such parking will interfere with traffic or the public safety, and no vehicle shall be parked at any time, within twenty-five feet of any fire hydrant.

Sec. 3. Lights on automobiles or motor vehicles being operated or standing upon said streets, must be kept burning in front and rear during the time the city lights on the streets are lighted and each of such automobiles or motor vehicles shall carry the state license exposed in front and rear, as required by the state law. Provided that any automobile or motor vehicle parked within the districts hereinafter described shall not need its front or rear light burning when the street lights are burning, said districts being described as follows:

Main street, from Williams street to Catherine street, Washington street from Fifth avenue to Ashley street, Liberty street, Fifth avenue to Ashley street, Huron street, Fourth avenue to Main street.

1. Provided that every motor vehicle equipped with and using electric light or lights upon any of the public streets of this city shall be provided and equipped with some practical and efficient device or devices whereby the forward light or lights of such vehicles shall be dimmed or lessened to such an extent that such electric light or lights or the reflection therefrom through such forward light or lights will not interfere with the sight of nor temporarily blind the vision of any pedestrian or the

driver of any approaching vehicle, and it shall be the duty of each and every driver or chauffeur of such motor vehicle or other vehicle equipped with and using electric light or lights of the vehicle being driven by him and cause such light or lights to be dimmed and lessened so as not to interfere with the sight or temporarily blind the vision of any pedestrian or driver of any approaching vehicle.

2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Resolved, that the grading and construction of the sidewalks hereinafter mentioned is deemed and declared a necessary improvement.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered that stone or cement sidewalks be graded, built and constructed in the city of Ann Arbor, and along the following property:

Eberbach Bld. Co., east side 4th ave., S. E. cor. Liberty. A piece of land beginning at the S. E. cor. 4th ave. and Liberty st., and running east 93 ft. on Liberty st.; thence south 44 ft.; thence west 93 ft. to east side 4th ave.; thence north 44 ft. on 4th ave. to place of beginning (four new blocks outside of walk laid to grade with balance of sidewalk).

Edward H. Croarkin, south side Hill st., S. E. cor. Washtenaw ave., lot 1, C. H. Millen's 2d addition.

City work, city build new sidewalk on East University ave., front of 6th ward voting building.

Resolution: That the City Clerk notify the Board of Education to connect all roof water conductor pipes on East University ave. side of Tappan school with storm sewer in East University ave.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Railway and Street committees, to whom were referred the street railway matters and changes of road bed on Main street, beg to report that they have, in company with City Engineer, Prof. Parker, President of Council and the Mayor carefully considered the several matters referred to this committee. We have investigated and gone over the work now under way and are convinced that the construction will be up to heavy standard and a great improvement over former conditions. Further, in regards to the double tracking from Huron to Catherine street, we regret to report that although the committee were unanimously in favor of this double track, we find that the Detroit, Jackson & Chicago Ry. cannot undertake the further extension at this time and your committee, which was given power to act, has given the D. J. & C. Ry., permission to extend their double track around the corner from Catherine into Main street, with the switch approximately 150 ft., south of Main and Catherine street intersection.
