To the Honorable Board of Public Works, City of Ann Arbor, Mich., Gentlemen: In the matter of the claims of Messrs. Barnes and O'Neil for the five-percent with held on the Edwin Street, now Hoover Avenue, storm water sewer, said claim amounting to the sum of \$302.55 and which was referred to the undersigned City Engineer and City Attorney at your meeting of April 7th, we beg leave to report as follows: We were both fairly familiar with this matter before your meeting of April 7th, said claim having been brought to our attention on several different occasions and we had previously made a thorough investigation of the same and from our investigation we believe that the contractors should be paid. From what we have been able to determine the repairs on this sewer were made under the direction of the then City Engineer and as the amount due the contractors has been held back for over three years we feel that the interest at the rate of five percent on the sum with held would be more than sufficient to repair the sewer.

We are further of the opinion that in the event that these contractors should bring suit on this claim that the City would have no defense to an action for the reason that the repairs were made as aforesaid and the walk has been in use by the city over four years during which time the contractors have not been called upon to make any repairs on the sidewalk nor has the City made any repairs during that time.

We therefore respectfully recommend that the amount due the contractors, less the interest be paid to said contractors, Barnes and O'Neil.
