Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Reichert presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance relative to Curbs and Gutters, passed May 6th, 1918 Approved May 7, 1918."

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That Section seven of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Curbs and Gutters,

passed May 6, 1918, and approved May 7, 1918," be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. After the certification of any such assessment district as provided in Section 6 of this ordinance, the Common Council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution adopted by a majority of all the members elect, authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute under their hands and the seal of the City of Ann Arbor, bonds, of said City payable to bearer, four years from the date of issue.

All such bonds shall be known as "Curb and Gutter Bonds" and issued in series conforming with the number of the curb and gutter district on account of which any such bonds shall have been issued. All such bonds shall be delivered by the City Clerk to the City Treasurer, provided, that not more than \$20,000 in amount of any such bonds shall be out standing at any one time.

Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after legal publication.

The chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"
