Gentlemen:

We wish to make the following report on the several ways of financing the Allen's Creek storm sewer:

1. A general bond issue on the

city at large.

2. A bond ssue and the establishing of an assessment district. A certain part of the cost to be assessed against all property in the district and the balance on the city at large.

3. A certain portion of the project could be built each year and the money raised in the general

tax for that year.

The project could be constructed as a county drain under the direction of the County Drain method Commissioner. By this ten (10) year bonds may be issued and an assessment district created. A certain portion of the cost will be assessed against the assessment district and the balance against the city at large. This method re-lieves the city of bonding on a bond issue as the County Dra'n the city at large. This method reon a Commissioner has power to issue bonds against the district without recourse to an election.

Considering the fact that Allen Creek drains considerable territory outside of the city and is the main drain of such territory it would seem that a county drain would be desirable and satisfactory to the city and to its citizens as well as all property owners in the territory. This method would be equitable and far to all concerned and after all due consideration we recommend that Allen's Creek be constructed as a county drain.

## Proposed Amendment to Section 171 of the Charter

By Ald. Lutz:

WHEREAS, the aggregate amount which the council may raise for the purpose of general funds shall not exceed in any one year three fourths of one percent of the assessed value of all real and personal property in the city, as provided by Section 171 of the charter of the city, and,

WHEREAS, this amount is not sufficient to permit the raising of funds neces ary for the operation of the several departments of the city unless the said Section 171 of the charter is amended now, there-

fore, be it

RESOLVED, that Section 171 of the charter of the city of Ann Arbor, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 171. The common counc I shall have the au h rity to assess levy and collect taxes on all the real personal and  $\epsilon$ state taxable in said city, which tax shall be and remain a lien upon the property so a sessed until the same shall be paid; provided that the aggrerate amount which the council may raise by general tax upon the taxable real and personal property for the purposes for which the several general funds are hereinafter constiluted shall not, except as hereotherwise provided exceed in any one year one per cent on the assessed value of all the real and personal property in the city made taxable by law: and provided furthc. That nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prohibit the common council of said city from regulating by tax or otherwise the business of dealing in malt. spirituous or ntoxicating l quors.

The common council shall have authority to assess levy and collect taxes on all the real and personal estate taxable in said city, which tax shall be and remain a lien upon the property so asses ed until the same shall be paid: Provided, That the aggregate amount which the counc I may raise by general tax upon the taxable real and personal property for the purposes for which the several general funds are herinafter constituted shall not, except as herein otherwise provided, exceed in any one year one per cent on the assessed value of all the real and personal properly in the city made taxable by law And provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as to prohibit the common councl of said city from regulating by tax or otherwise the busines of dealing in malt, spirituous or intoxicaling liquors.
