**Sewer Committee Report**

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen: Your Sewer Committee respectfully recommends that the plans, specifications and estimates for construction of storm sewer on Broadway from Jones-st. to Cedar Bend Drive and from Traver Creek to Moore-st., on Moore-st. from Broadway to Pontiac-st. and on Cedar-st. from Pontiac-st. to Wright-st. the storm sewer on S. Main-st. from Madison to Hill-sts., and from Davis-ave. to Pauline-Blvd., and from Fisher-ave. to Berkley-ave.; and the storm sewer on Washtenaw-ave. from Austin-ave. 300 feet north and 300 feet south, from Fair Oaks Parkway to Wayne, from Cambridge road to Ferdon road and across Washtenaw-ave. at Oxford road, as approved by the Board of Public Works March 21, 1923, be approved and the Board of Public Works be instructed to advertise for bids and proceed with the construction of said storm sewers according to the charter and ordinance governing same.

Your committee further recommends that the Board of Public Work be instructed to advertise for bids for the construction of storm

sewer on Forest-ave. from Cambridge road to Forest Court and thence across private property to S. University-ave. and Washtenaw-ave. in accordance with plans and specifications approved by Council April 17, 1922.

Your committee further recommends that storm sewers be constructed as follows: on Fourteenth-st. from Belser to Volland-sts., on Volland-st. from Fourteenth-st. to Camden Court, on Camden Court from Volland-st. to Geddes-ave. and on Geddes-ave. from Camden Court to Observatory-st.; on S. State-st. from Dewey-ave. to Boulevard Drive; on S. Main-st. from Packard-st. to Jefferson-s. and on W. Jefferson-st. from Main-st. to the main storm sewer; and that the City Engineer be instructed to prepare plans, specifications and estimates of cost for said storm sewers.

Your committee further recommends that the construction of the above mentioned storm sewers is hereby deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.
