Resolution Ordering Pavement Bonds

Whereas, the Common Council has authorized the construction by the Board of Public Works of pavement on Thompson street from Liberty street to Packard street, known as District No. 58; pavement on Hamilton Place from East William street to East Jefferson street, known as District No. 59; pavement on Alley from Well street to Scott street said alley being parallel to end between Lincoln Avenue and Martin Place, known as District No. 60; pavement on Maynard street from William street to Jefferson street, known as District No. 61; pavement on Oak Lane from Austin Avenue to Fair Oaks Parkway, known as District No. 62; pavement on Observatory street from Geddes

Avenue to Ann street, known as District No. 63; and the Common Council having caused to be certified to the City Assessor the lands, tenements and premises to be assessed for cost of said public improvements, street intersections and twenty per cent of the balance excepted, therefore be it

Resolved, and it is hereby ordered that the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized and required to sign and countersign respectively and execute, under their hands and the seal of the City of Ann Arbor, pavement bonds of the City of Ann Arbor under date of January 2nd, 1925, as follows to-wit: District No. 58, the sum of Thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00); District No. 59, the sum of Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00); District No. 60, the sum of Two thousand two hundred dollars, (\$2,200.00); District No. 61, the sum of Six thousand, five hundred dollars (\$6,500.00); District No. 62, the sum of One thousand, four hundred dollars (\$1,400.00); District No. 63 the sum of Twenty seven thousand dollars (\$27,000.00); that being the estimated cost of said improvements, payable to hearer in ten equal annual in-

stallments from and after the first day of August, 1924, with interest at four and one-half (4 1-2) per cent per annum, payable annually on the first day of August in each and every year, as evidenced by interest coupons to be thereto attached, bearing the signature of the Mayor and City Clerk of the City of Ann Arbor, principal and interest to be payable at the office of the City Treasurer, City Hall, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Resolved, further, that said Mayor and City Clerk be and they are hereby authorized and directed to deliver said bonds, when executed, to the City Treasurer, and that said bonds and coupons be substantially in the form for pavement bonds and coupons adopted by the Common Council August 4th, 1919.
