## Approval of Plans For Federal Aid Road.

By Ald. Sweet:
Whereas, plans and specifications have been prepared and filed with the city (or village) clerk by the State Highwav Department for the improvement of the following named streets in the city (or village) to wit: Broadway Street from Canal Street t/" Moore St., and thence northeasterly on the Federal Aid Road to the City Limits the same being known as project No. F. A. $82-\mathrm{C}$.

Whereas, the said plans provide for the improvement of the surfaces of said streets by the state to a width of not to exceed twenty feet in the center or traveled portion thereof together with additional improvements for the use and benefit of the said city which
additional improvements include all necessary drainage structures, and

Whereas, it appears that said plans are in proper form and are satisfactory to this body, and

Whereas, it is understood and agreed that the city it is to pay for all improvements except the strip. which is to be improved by the state, as outlined on plans submitted September 21st, 1925.

Whereas it is understood and agreed that the state proposes the following arrangements:

To purchase additional right of way on the west side of the present location of Traver Street to give a minimum width on Traver Street of fifty-six feet, in lieu of the portion of Traver Street necessary for back slope.

The state to erect at top of back srope not to exceed two hundred fifty feet of woven wire fence four feet high, erected with wooden posts, fence to be curved wire top.

No excavation to be made on Traver Street by the State except that necessary to give our regular back slope on the project.

The state to turnpike new location of Traver Street to conform with remainder of street, to rake out oversize stone, but to add no new material.

Resolved, further, in consideration of the passing of this resolution the State Highway Department gives and grants unto the City of Ann Arbor the right at all times to install and maintain public utility lines and make other municipal improvements in said street with the right to lay sidewalks and other public improvements and to assess the adjoining lot owners for such improvements as are assessable pursuant to the charter and ordinances of the City of Ann Arbor and the laws of the State of Michigan. Provided however, that the City shall submit to the State Highway Department plans and specifications for such utility lines at least fourteen days before beginning the construction of such public work, with the understanding that the City shall be governed in the construction by the suggestions of the State Highway Highway Department to safeguard the public safety of the users of the said highway or street. The City shall repair, as soon as practicable, at its own cost, any damage to the
pavement caused to the pavement by any such work. The City shall likewise be governed by any suggestions by the State as to safeguarding of these public improvements during any city construction. And for all ither purposes the City shatl have the reasonable use and control of the said street as provided by the Constitution, Laws of the State of Michigan, and Charter and Ordinances of the City and further, that as additional territory is added to the City and more of the said street included within the municipality, the City shal! continue as to such new portions to have the same rights as herein enumerated. It is also understood that this agreement shall not interfere with the State's rights at any time to carry on further construction such as widening of the pavement or reconstruction thereof.

The City of Ann Arbor to take care of construction of any sidewalk.

Therefore be it resolved that said plans be and the same are approved and the consent of the city is hereby given for the making of said improvements in accordance therewith.

Be it further resolved that the city improve its portion of said streets in accordance with the plans and specifications as piepared by the State Highway Department at such time as the City shall by resolution so declare and that the city clerk be instructed to advertise for bids for such improvements, when so authorized, said bids to be received at the same time and place as the bids to be received by the State Highway Department, if possible.

Be it further resolved that the Resident Engineer of the State Highway Department having charge of the supervision of said work on behalf of the State is hereby authorized to act for and represent the city in the supervision and inspection of that portion of the improvement belonging to the city and that the State Highway Department be reimbursed out of the city treasury, on bill rendered by the State Highway Department, for the actual cost of such supervision and inspection said actual cost to be determined when the work is completed and to bear the same proportion
