Ordinance Committee

Ald. Freeman presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance relating to and regulating the emission of dense smoke containing soot, cinders or other deleterious substances, from chimneys, stacks, flues, tar kettles and other contrivances within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor, declaring the same a nuisance and prescribing the penalties for the violation of this ordinance," passed November 6, 1922; approved November 8, 1922.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That section 1 of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relating to and Regulating the Emission of Dense Smoke Containing Soot, Cinders or Other Deleterious Substances, from chimneys, stacks, flues, tar kettles and other contrivances within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, declaring the same a nuisance and prescribing the penalties for the violation of his ordinance," passed November 6, 1922, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The emission of dense smoke from any smokestack or chimney connected with any stationary engine, steam boiler, locomotive, steam roller, steam derrick, or other similar machines, or from any smokestack or chimney from any apartment house, or multiple dwelling, clubhouse or fraternity house, or lodge, office, office building, institution, establishment, place, premises or any building used as a factory, or for any purpose of trade other than a private house, or from any tar kettle, machine, furnace or contrivance within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, which smoke contains soot, cinders, or other substances in sufficient quantities to be deleterious to health or an inconvenience to the general public within the limits of said city, shall be and is hereby declared a public nuisance; provided, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to the emission of dense smoke, containing soot, cinders or other substances from any stack, flue or chimney for a period of not exceeding two minutes in any fifteen minute period, when a fire box or furnace is necessarily being cleaned out or a new fire being built; provided, further, that this shall not apply to manufacturers or industries which are obliged to use an "open fire" in the conduct of their business.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force ten days from legal publication thereof.
