Gentlemen: We, the undersigned property owners owning a majority of the foot frontage of the property fronting on Broadway between Swift-st. and Maiden lane, and understanding that the State Highway Department will soon pave the central twenty foot portion of each street within the limits aforesaid, respectfully peti-

tion your honorable body to cause the balance of the width of said street, within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved and the costs of the said work to be spread and collected as follows: First, that the cost of paving a strip fifteen and one-half feet wide on each side of the highway pavement, a total of thirty-one feet, to be spread and collected in accordance with the provisions of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Street Pavements," passed July 7, 1897, as amended; and second, that the cost of paving the remaining width, said to be six and one-half feet, to the curb and gutter on each side of the street to be at the expense of the City of Ann Arbor, and your petitioners will ever pray.

Water Committee Report.

Ann Arbor, Mich., July 28, 1926.

Your Water Committee met with the Water Commissioners on July 27th. After a careful discussion of Maury and Gordon's report and of the general situation as to the water supply and distribution in Ann Arbor, it was decided to recommend to the Council that it ask the voters of Ann Arbor some time this fall to pass on the question of authorizing \$800,000 in bonds to be used for the improvement of the water system.

The Committee believes that it is desirable to put in a nine million gallon filtration and softening plant at Station No. 1, at once; to raise, enlarge, and cover the reservoir and to lay a part of the mains referred to in Maury and Gordon's report. Some of these mains are not needed at the present time and it is proposed that if \$800,000 in bonds is authorized, only \$700,000 should be issued at the present time, the balance being used to take care of the additional mains when they become necessary.

It is also recommended that the

sinking fund and interest charges in connection with this bond issue be met by an increase in water rates, and not in any part be an increase in taxation. It is estimated that less than 50 per cent increase in the water rates will take care of these charges.

It should be said that the Committee approached this problem with the idea of merely enlarging the reservoir, putting in the distribution system and building one unit of a filtration plant at Station No. 1. When it was realized that a nine million gallon plant would cost only approximately \$100,000 more than one about half as large, and that the distribution costs, and the cost of the work on the reservoir, would not be changed at all, it was decided that it would be inadvisable to proceed along the plans we originally contemplated.

It is recommended that the Council adopt this report and order steps taken to submit to the voters in the fall the question of authorizing \$800,000 in bonds for the purpose stated.

Wm. C. Maulbetsch, W. S. Moore, Joseph A. Bursley, Water Committee.

Dr. Conrad Georg gave a very interesting account of conditions of the Huron river for a period of years and advised the Council not to use the river water for its water supply as there have been times when the river was nearly dry, and explained the possibility of an inadequate supply in the future, and that the pollution of the water would increase as the property adjoining the river is rapidly being developed for homes and resort purposes. He stated that he believed that there was sufficient water available without resorting to the river and recommended the development of the supply at the Steere Farm and W. Washington St. properties now owned by City and mentioned other possible sources of supply.

Moved by Ald. Maulbetsch, that the report of Water Committee be referred back to said committee.
