From Board of Water Commissioners

Ann Arbor, Michigan,

Sept. 3, 1926.

To the Honorable, the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Gentlemen:—

In reply to your request that the Board of Water Commissioners furnish an estimate of cost of cleaning the wells and putting the West Washington Street Station in shape for operation and also an estimate of cost of sinking an 8-inch test well at the said station.

We respectfully refer you to the Annual Report of the Board of Water Commissioners for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1925, for the reasons of discontinuing pumping water from the No. 2 or Washington Street Pumping Station. They are as follows:

1st. Comparatively small amount of water, being about one-half million gallons in good seasons and less in dry, that this station furnished daily.

2nd. The growth of the City in this district resulting in almost a complete encircling of the region by dwellings.

3rd. Contamination of the water supply by surface water.

4th. The reconstruction of practically the entire collecting system is necessary to avoid it being contaminated by surface water from the streets and from the public refuse dump near Crest Avenue.

The present wells are so badly corroded, most of them having been in use over 25 years, that it is impossible to remove the screens and to use them again therefore requiring driving new wells and the

reconstructing of the collecting system.

This district from the pumping station to above Eighth Street was thoroughly investigated with wells by the Ann Arbor Water Company. The supply located by them is near the surface of the ground and for that reason and because of the nature of the district the supply has since been declared unsatisfactory by the City Chemist and the State Health Department.

An 8-inch test well to rock would cost about \$2,100.00. The cost of a collecting system and pumping station cannot be accurately estimated until after the test well is put down as the cost of that work will depend upon the location of the wells and the quantity of water located.

In our opinion a more satisfactory and safe water can be obtained from other sources at a lesser cost.

At the No. 1 Pumping Station, located at the river, there are flowing wells which yield about 300,000 gallons per day. This district was well explored by the Ann Arbor Water Company who at one time had pipes laid to a spring near Fosters Bridge and to a spring across the river to what is now the Barton Hills Subdivision. These pipe lines were abandoned after a severe typhoid epidemic was traced to them. At the present time river water sterilized with chlorine gas is pumped to augment the No. 3 or Steere Farm well water supply.

There are a number of springs within the City Limits and some a short distance outside the city which supply small quantities of water and are subject to the same variation in flow as other ground water supplies depending on the amount of rainfall. As the maximum demand for water in the City is in the dry periods when these springs give their minimum flow they do not yield sufficient quantities of water to consider them as an addition to the permanent water supply. These springs are in thickly inhabited or will soon be thickly inhabited districts which would make the water for domestic use unsafe without chemical treatment.

At the present time the No. 3 or Steere Farm Pumping Station yields a sufficient quantity of water to supply the City's needs for all except high demand periods occurring in January, February, June, July and August, when the deficiency is supplied from the No. 1 Pumping Station with Huron River water which is chemically treated.

With the steady growth of our City it will only be a few years when we will have completely outgrown our present ground water supply. The chemically treated raw river water supplied now part of the time has been made safe so far as bacteria is concerned, but is not satisfactory because of no means to remove the mud and silt contained in it if pumping be required during flood periods of the river. Filtration would make the river water safe and satisfactory for domestic use at all times.

We are also outgrowing our trunk line mains in the distribution system with the result that the East and West sections of the City on high ground have poor domestic pressure and questionable fire protection.

In reference to your inquiry as to the plan and estimates of cost for enlarged distribution system and enlarged reservoir. Your honorable body at our request employed a water expert from without the city to give an independent opinion of our water question and you have his recommendations and estimates of cost.

We have incorporated in our recommendations following an estimate of cost based on the information contained in the above referred to report.

The Water Works Department is self-sustaining—that is, its revenue from the sale of water is sufficient to pay the operating expenses, maintenance, the interest on the outstanding bonds, a sum sufficient to retire the bonds and a surplus which has been sufficient for current extensions. With enlargements in plant and distribution systems the water rates can be adjusted so that the water plant will remain self-sustaining.

Therefore after a careful study of the water question by your Wa-

ter Commissioners and after investigating all sources of supply, we make the following recommendations

1. That the Steere Farm, or No. 3 Pumping Station, be operated to the maximum capacity of the wells.

2. That to augment the Steere Farm supply a filtration plant of 6 million gallons per day capacity be constructed at No. 1 Pumping Station to supply filtered river water which will be safe and palatable.

3. That the reservoir near Chubb Road be enlarged, concreted and covered.

4. That supply mains of large capacity be constructed to the low pressure areas to give higher pressure and adequate quantity of water for domestic and fire use. The cost of these improvements are estimated from the Maury & Gordon Report to be as follows:

5. That your honorable body supply funds in the amount of \$678,400 to meet the above improvements which will satisfy the present requirements of the water works system and which will be of sufficient capacity, we believe, for 10 years in the future with our present rate of growth. Both principal and interest of money borrowed for the Water Department can be paid from revenues of the Department.
