Gentlemen: May we ask your Honorable Body to reconsider your action of August 16 when you passed a resolution ordering The Detroit Edison Company to remove the poles from Greenwood Avenue between Packard Street and East University Avenue on account of the City constructing a curbing and sidewalk at this location?

#### Sidewalk Committee Report

To the Honorable, the Common Council, Gentlemen:

Your Sidewalk committee respectfully recommends that the following sidewalks be ordered built and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, that the grading and construction of the sidewalks hereinafter mentioned is deemed and declared to be necessary public improvement.

Therefore, It is hereby ordered that Portland Cement concrete sidewalks be graded, built and constructed in the City of Ann Arbor on and along the following property; width of walk to be five feet unless otherwise stated:

Greenwood-av. — North side, westward from E. University-av., for two lots, Nos. 1 and 3, Waples Add.
