b. Eighth Street between Liberty Street and Washington Street, from 3:30 p. m. to 10 p. m.

c. Felch Street between Spring Street and N. Main Street from 6 p. m. to 10 p. m.

d. Catherine Street between In-galls Street and Glen Avenue from 3:30 p. m. to 10 p. m.

e. John Street between Division Street and Fifth Avenue from 3:30 p. m. to 9 p. m.

That bobs for coasting be allowed only on Eighth Street and Felch Street.

Resolution Relative Elections And Registration

ments for registration to precede said elections and that registration shall be at the office of the City Clerk during regular office hours and that on the third and fourth Saturdays preceding said elections the office of the City Clerk shall be open from 8 o'clock a. m. until 8 o'clock p. m., Eastern Standard Time, for the purpose of registration; and the City Clerk is hereby authorized to appoint such deputies as may be necessary for registration and to properly comply with the absent voter's law, such deputies to receive such compensation as the finance committee may determine.

Resolution Ordering Curb and Gutter Bonds

By Alderman Lutz:

Whereas, this Common Council has authorized the construction by the Board of Public Works of curbs and gutters in curb and gutter districts Nos. 72, 75, 80, 87, and Nos. 91 to 101 inclusive, and this Common Council having caused to be certified to the City Assessor the lands, tenements and premises to be assessed for the cost of said public improvements and the amounts required to be levied, spread and assessed on and upon each and every of the regular annual assessment rolls of the City of Ann Arbor, therefore be it

Resolved, and it is hereby ordered, that the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized and required to sign and countersign respectively and execute, under their hands and the seal of the City of Ann Arbor, curb and gutter bonds of the City of Ann Arbor under date of January 3, 1927, as follows, to-wit:

For District No. 72, the sum of \$1,960.00; for District No. 75, the sum of \$5,368.00; for district No. 80, the sum of \$1,060.00; for district No. 87, the sum of \$3,800.00; for district No. 91, the sum of \$776.00; for district No. 92, the sum of \$1,660.00; for district No. 93, the sum of \$2,680.00; for district No. 94, the sum of \$1,692.00; for district No. 95 the sum of \$2,160.00 for district No. 96, the sum of \$4,000.00; for district No. 97, the sum of \$3,356.00; for district No. 98, the sum of \$620.00; for district No. 99, the sum of \$3,172.00; for district No. 100, the sum of \$3,136.00; for district No. 101, the sum of \$4,000.00; that being less than the cost of said public improvements; said bonds payable to bearer in four equal annual installments beginning August 1, 1927, with interest at four and one half per cent per annum, payable annually on the first day of August in each and every year, as evidenced by interest coupons to be thereto attached.

Resolved, further, that said Mayor and City Clerk be and they are hereby authorized and directed to deliver said bonds, when executed, to the City Treasurer, who is authorized to sell said bonds at not less than par and accrued interest, and said bonds and coupons shall be substantially in the form of pavement bonds and coupons adopted by the Common Council August 4, 1919.

Resolved, further, that the estimated period of usefulness of said curbs and gutters is hereby determined to be fifteen years and upwards.

Adopted by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Jocelyn, Graf, Sweet, Lucas, Dwyer, Hammial, Freeman, Lutz, Young, Pres. Woodbury, 10. Nays, none.
