Communications From Mayor

Mayor's Office, April 21, 1927.

To the Honorable, the Common Council, Gentlemen:

In the minutes of the meeting of April 18th, 1927 appears the following:

"Moved that hereafter all appointments made to an office needing the confirmation of this council be laid over until a subsequent regular meeting of the council before this council takes any action toward approval or confirmation."

Two considerations cause me to question whether this action is advisable:

1. Your body has the authority under the charter of laying any appointment on the table so that it may be investigated before being acted upon. I consider that this authority which you may use at your discretion is sufficient protection in the matter of appointments.

2. Conditions might arise which would necessitate appointment and confirmation to be made as speedily as possible, in which event this

resolution might act as a hindrance.

Allow me to explain that as far as any appointments that I may make are concerned, I shall willingly have the same thoroughly and completely investigated before your Honorable Body votes upon the confirmation or rejection, and I veto your action solely because conditions might arise where it would be impossible to delay matters in the manner that your resolution would necessitate.

For these two reasons I hereby veto this part of the proceedings quoted above.

The Board of Park Commission-
 ers request your authorization to
 deed to the Board of Education a
 portion of West Park described as
 follows:

All that parcel of land lying
 North of the Rettich, Seybold,
 Rohde and Daskam properties,
 East of the Laubengayer land,
 south of the top of the high bank
 on the South side of the stream
 flowing through West Park, and
 west of Harry H. Atwell's subdivi-
 sion; this area to be surveyed and
 accurate description recorded on
 the deed.

In consideration of the deeding
 of the above described land the
 City of Ann Arbor is to receive
 deeds to several parcels of land on
 the North of the present West Park
 for which options are now on file
 together with a strong fence of
