Gentlemen:

Permit us to submit the following proposal for the installation of ornamental underground street lights on E. Liberty Street from Fifth Avenue to State Street, the new lights to be added to the present underground lighting system under the terms of the street lighting contract now in effect between the City of Ann Arbor and The Detroit Edison Company.

We recommend the installation of 16-600 c. p. lamps spaced in staggered positions on alternate sides of the street, the distance between lights on the same side of the street to be approximately 162 feet. The installation of new underground ornamental lamps will make it possible to remove, in this area, 2-250 c. p. lamps and 2-600 c. p. lamps of the overhead type.

The cost will be as follows:

16-600 c. p. lamps at \$5.50

 Gentlemen:

As you are aware, from the reports which we have submitted to you, our motor bus operations in Ann Arbor have been operated at a very heavy loss and it is impossible for us to continue these operations if such losses must continue. We have discussed this matter in detail with Mayor Staebler and your Railway Committee and require that changes be made in our tariff and schedule to reduce our losses.

We respectfully request your honorable body to authorize us to immediately make effective, and to continue on a day to day basis, upon our Ann Arbor City opera-

tions a tariff of passenger fares which shall be as follows:

Single ride cash fare 10 cents.

Twelve tickets (12 rides) for \$1.00.

Pass good for one calendar week entitling bearer to ride at any time and any number of times during that calendar week for \$1.75. The validity of such weekly pass to expire every Saturday night at midnight.

Universal free transfers on all lines.

Children under five years of age to be carried free when accompanied by an adult paid passenger.

We respectfully request your honorable body to authorize us to immediately make effective, and to continue on a day to day basis, upon our Ann Arbor City operations a schedule of transportation service which shall be as follows:
