It gives me great pleasure to announce that, beginning with July 1st, our company will put into effect a new gas rate which gives a reduction of five cents per thousand in all steps of our rate along the line.

This new rate takes effect at once and applies to bills which will be rendered on July 1st.

This rate reduction will mean quite a saving to all the gas consumers of Ann Arbor and it has been made possible through economies made in our operation which we are willing to pass along in the form of a lower gas rate.

The new gas rate will be \$1.20 net for the first 5 M feet, \$1.00 for all gas used over 5 M feet, and over 200,000 feet at 80c per foot. To these net rates is added 25c per thousand if the bill is not paid by the tenth of the month, which has always been the past procedure.

Spousing shall be removed

of dirt, grease, etc., by local application of inflammable liquid. Any person, firm or corporation carrying on the business of spongeing as above defined, solely or in connection with or as a part of any other business, shall be deemed a dry cleaner, and, as such, subject to the provisions of this ordinance. In considering the foregoing proposals to amend, supplement or change the zoning ordinance, reference is hereby made to the map of used regulations and more particularly described as "Map of the City of Ann Arbor, Mich., 1923, 1925, 1927, 1928, showing districts for use regulations" by order of the Common Council.

Arguments were heard for and against the proposals from persons interested.

Ordered entered in minutes.

Any persons, firm or corporation carrying on the business of sponging as above defined, solely or in connection with or as a part of any other business, shall be deemed a dry cleaner, and, as such, subject to the provisions of this ordinance. In considering the foregoing proposals to amend, supplement or change the zoning ordinance, reference is hereby made to the map of used regulations and more particularly described as "Map of the City of Ann Arbor, Mich., 1923, 1925, 1927, 1928, showing districts for use regulations."
