Dear Sir:

I return herewith the proceedings of the Common Council of October 1, 1928, without approval. The following portion of the proceedings wherein the recommendation of the meeting of the committee of the whole was concurred in by the Council is disapproved:

"Committee of Whole Report

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 24, '28

Pursuant to call Council met as a Committee of the Whole at 7:30 p. m. and the following members were present: Ald. Slauson, Wuerth, Maulbetsch, Almendinger, Harris, Draper, Severance, Kurth, Bursley, Townley, Fisher, Pres. Woodbury, 12.

Absent: Ald. Graf, Bradley, Lutz, 3.

Ald. Slauson read extracts of election laws relative to number of

voters permissible in a precinct with and without voting machines, also read a report of approximate expenses necessary to subdivide existing wards to comply with the State law. Each Alderman present expressed his views on the matter.

Moved by Alderman Bursley and supported by Alderman Slauson, that Committee recommends to Common Council the purchasing of voting machines on the ten year plan. Adopted.

My reasons for so doing are as follows:

1. There is no appropriation in the budget for this purpose.

2. This matter seems to me to be of sufficient import that taxpayers of this city should have a voice in the matter. If the electors decide that they desire voting machines the money to buy the same could be raised without paying a high rate of interest therefor.

3. The question has been raised as to whether the machine in question is the most economical and practical in the market.

4. The rapidity with which the use of the voting machines was decided upon and the haste with which this particular machine was selected raises the question whether we have been thorough enough in our consideration of the matter and entirely businesslike in our choice.

For the reasons mentioned I question whether we have acted in the best interests of our taxpayers, and in the hope that the matter will be given more complete study and will be brought more fully to the attention of our citizens whose money we propose to spend, I therefore deem it wise to take this

action.

Also lots 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26 of Brown and Kearney Subdivision, block 1 north, range 14 east, according to recorded plat thereof, property lying north of East Huron Street and west of Forest Avenue.

No one appearing for or against the proposed amendments, the meeting adjourned.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING AND RESTRICTING THE

LOCATION OF RESIDENCES, TRADES, INDUSTRIES, BUSINESSES AND THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS DESIGNED FOR SPECIFIED USES, AND ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES OF DISTRICTS FOR THE SAID PURPOSES; PROVIDING AND ESTABLISHING SET BACK LINES AND PROVIDING FOR THE VIOLATION OF SAID ORDINANCE," PASSED SEPTEMBER 4, 1923; APPROVED SEPTEMBER 6, 1923; AMENDED JANUARY 19, 1925; AMENDED SEPTEMBER 21, 1925; AMENDED NOVEMBER 21, 1927." AS AMENDED AUGUST 6, 1928.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That section two of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Regulating, Restricting, and Districting the Location of residences, trades, industries, businesses and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, and establishing the boundaries of districts for the said purposes; Providing for and establishing set back lines and providing for the violation of said Ordinance." Passed September 4, 1923; Approved September 6, 1923; Amended January 19, 1925; Amended September 21, 1925; Amended November 21, 1927, as amended Aug. 6, 1928, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. Use District Regulations:

In order to regulate and restrict the location of residences, trades, industries, businesses and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, the City of Ann Arbor is hereby divided into "Use Districts," of which there shall be four, known as

"A" Residence District

"B" Residence District

"C" Local Business District

"D" Commercial and Industrial District.

The City of Ann Arbor is hereby divided into four (4) districts and the boundaries of such districts are shown upon the map at-

tached hereto and made a part of this ordinance, being designated as the "Map of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, 1923 - 1925 - 1927 - 1928, showing Districts for Use Regulations," and said map and all notations, references and other things shown thereon shall be as much a part of this ordinance as if the matters and things set forth by said map were all fully described therein.

Except as hereafter provided no buildings shall be erected or altered, nor shall any building or premises be used for any purpose other than is permitted in the Use District in which such building or premises is located.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication thereof.
