streets, earnestly request the Common Council to enact an ordinance imposing restrictions upon the removal of such buildings.

Furthermore, pending the enactment of a suitable ordinance, this Board declines to give permission for the removal of any buildings through the streets the over-all width of which exceeds 24 feet, length 40 feet, and which is more than two stories and an attic in height.
