Report of Public Hearing

To the Honorable,
the Common Council
Gentlemen:

I submit the following report of public hearing relative to proposed closing, vacating and discontinuing of that certain part of Pine Ridge Street described as follows: Beginning at a point on the Easterly line of "Westwood Hills" 30 feet southerly of the northeast corner of lot 98 "Westwood Hills," thence northeasterly along the easterly line of "Westwood Hills" to the northeast corner of lot 98 "Westwood Hills," thence southeasterly deflecting 90 degrees, 08 minutes, 00 seconds to the right

15.05 feet to a point of curve; thence in the arc of a circular curve to the right of 81.79 feet through a central angle of 51 degrees, 33 minutes, 00 seconds, to a point of tangency; thence southeasterly along tangent 63.5 feet to a point of curve; thence in the arc of a circular curve to the left of radius 11.76 feet through a central angle of 78 degrees, 48 minutes, 00 seconds, to a point of tangency, thence southwesterly in the arc of a circular curve to the left of radius 37 feet to a point on the westerly line of Pine Ridge, 15 feet southeasterly of the northeast corner of Pine Ridge; thence northwesterly along the southwesterly line of Pine Ridge 93 feet to a point of tangency; thence in the arc of a circular curve to the left of radius 51.79 feet through a central angle of 51 degrees, 33 minutes, 00 seconds, to a point of tangency; thence westerly 15 feet to the place of beginning, being a part of the northeast quarter of section 30, Town 2 south, Range 6 east; and of a certain platted alley described as follows: A parcel of land 25 links in width, running north from S. University Avenue between lots 35 and 34 Smith's Addition to the City of Ann Arbor, Washtenaw County, Michigan.

Gentlemen:

On question of closing part of Pine Ridge, a description of which is carried in report of August 30, 1929, Mr. Jacob Gwinner stated that there were two reasons why he disapproved of closing this street: (1) to the dead end of this or any other street; (2) that he might have changed his mind and not purchased property if he had known of this street not being continued through.

Mr. S. A. Moran stated that he bought his property with the understanding that the street would be closed, having talked matter over with City Engineer and Park Superintendent.

On closing of alley running north from South University Ave., description of which is given in the report of Public Hearing of August 30, 1929, there was no one appeared for or against the change.
