From Mayor Edward W. Staebler relative to water question to be voted upon at the April election and suggesting that a committee of 15 or 20 representative citizens be appointed to study water distribution system to verify the necessity of new reservoir and mains, to consider and answer objections, and to disseminate as widely as possible an appreciation of the necessity of the improvements which have been called for.

Moved by Ald. Sauer that Mayor Stasbler, President Myers and Ald. Freeman be authorized to appoint such a committee.

Lighting Committee

To the Honorable Common Council,
Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Gentlemen:

Your Lighting Committee respectfully recommends the following changes and additions in the street lighting system:

1. That the City Clerk give the Detroit Edison Company an order to install 1 200-Watt light to complete the underdeck lighting of the Broadway Grade Separation Bridge.

2. That a 250-Watt light be placed at the intersection of Pleasant Place and Abbott Avenue.

3. That a 600-Watt light be placed at the intersection of Linwood and Arbana in place of the present small light.

4. That a 100-Watt light be installed near 1709 South University Avenue.

5. That the light near the intersection of South University Ave. and Oxford Road be lowered and placed in the center of the intersection.

6. That the small light at the corner of Vinewood Avenue and Wayne Street be replaced by a 600-Watt light and the light placed in the center of the intersection.

7. That a 100-Watt light be placed in the center of Pear St. opposite Apple Street.

8. That lights at Kingsley Street and Fourth Avenue and Kingsley Street and Main Street be lowered and the light at Kingsley Street and Detroit Street be relocated.

9. That the light at the intersection of Jackson Avenue and Grandview be lowered and placed in the center of Jackson Avenue.

10. That a 600-Watt light be placed at the intersection of Franklin, Hutchins and Potter and that the small light on Franklin between Hutchins and Pauline be discontinued.

11. That a 250-Watt light be placed on Vinewood Avenue near No. 2220.

We further recommend that lights be installed and located under the direction of the Engineering Department.
