MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Ald. Hall:

WHEREAS, The City of Ann Arbor has, since the last census enlarged its territory and inclued within the city limits several populous localities, and has also increased, and is increasing in population, and now contains within its limits, as near as can be estimated, thirteen thousand permanent inhabitants, and is supplied with electric lights and street cars and accommodated with three railroads, and,

WHEREAS, It is also the site of the University of Michigan, with all its departments, with a matriculation of two thousand, six hundred and fifty students, and is also the site of the Ann Arbor High School, or preparatory school, which is one of the finest, if not the finest, high school in the United States, with a matriculation of eight hundred students, and it is also the site of the Ann Arbor School of Music, which, although in its infancy, already numbers many students, and,

WHEREAS, Not only the students aforesaid find homes within the borders of the city, but in many instances they bring with them their fathers and mothers and guardians and families, who temporarily make Ann Arbor their

residence, and,

Whereas, In addition thereto there is also a considerable number of manufacturing institutions within said city employing on an average, a thousand transient workmen, thereby constituting a floating population in the city of Ann Arbor, of about five thousand people, who are not included in any census enumeration of said city; that in addition thereto, there is a populous community, estimated at three thousand people, surrounding Ann Arbor not included in the city limits, who receive their mail at the Post Office in the said city,

WHEREAS, The accommodations at the present Post Office are totally inadequate to accommodate this floating population, notwithstanding the free delivery system in this city, the students and other floating population decline to, and the surrounding communities cannot, avail themselves thereof, and congregate every day at the present Post Office in great numbers. That the lobby of said Post Office is altogether too small and limited in its capacity to accommodate anything like the number of said population that daily congregate there for their mails, thereby causing disorder and in several instances, provoking conflict between citizens, police and student population, to the disturbance of the peace of the people of the city; that in consequence thereof the ladies of the city are unable to obtain their mails during that portion of the day in which said floating population so congregate at the present Post Office; that the building in which said Post Office is located is not centrally located, but in such a quarter of said city as to compel the student population to traverse the whole of the business part of the city in order to reach the Post Office, thereby often blocking up the

the Post Office, thereby often blocking up the business street and impeding business.

Therefore Resolved, That it is the sincere and universal request, without distinction of party or policy, of the people of this city, that it is the present duty of the general government to at once provide a suitable and commodius Post Office building for the city of Ann Arbor, Resolved, That our Congressman Hon. James S. Gorman be, and he is hereby, respectfully requested to use his best efforts to secure, on the

Resolved, That our Congressman Hon. James S. Gorman be, and he is hereby, respectfully requested to use his best efforts to secure, on the part of the general government, such action as will result in the construction and equipment of a Post Office building in the city of Ann Arbor, not only centrally located, but snfficiently commodious to accommodate all its people.

Resolved, We hereby most earnestly solicit the aid and assistance of all friends of the city of Ann Arbor and the University of Michigan, and lovers of good government, to use their kind offices to the accomplishment of the

above object.

Resolved further, that the city clerk do certify this resolution under the seal of the city to Hon. James S. Gorman.
