Your committee on streets to whom was referred the resolution relating to the construction of a side-track across South Main street with power to act in the premises, respectfully submit the following report:

Your committee visited and inspected the premises, and found that to grant the request of Mr. Bodmer, would be a great favor to him and a substantial benefit to the railway company, and no particular injury to the city, and we concluded to permit the side-track to be constructed, on the condition mentioned in the resolution. Such condition being more particularly stated in a memorandum thereof, which your committee thought prudent to require, a copy of which is submitted herewith.

Your committee recommend that the form of such memorandum be approved, that the action of your committee in granting such permission be affirmed, and that the execution of such memorandum, and the supervision of the construction of such side-track, and its planking be referred to the Board of Public Works.

Ann Arbor City, April 5, 1893.

The monthly reports of the City Treasurer, City Clerk, Marshal, and Superintendent of the Poor, were read and ordered placed on file.

Ald. Ferguson moved that the vote on resolutions regarding the laying of gas ordinances on the table be reconsidered. Adopted.

Ald. Wines moved that the resolution of Ald. Snow in regard to laying gas ordinances on the table be rescinded. Adopted.

After which the chair having stated the question to be, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

On motion of Ald. Prettyman the following amendment was read and substituted for Section 6.

SECTION 6.—The fuel gas furnished

by the company at seventy-five per thousand cubic feet shall contain an average of at least four hundred available heat units per cubic foot, tests to be evaporative. Provided that if the company shall furnish fuel gas at a price less than seventy-five cents per thousand cubic feet, such gas may have fewer than four hundred units to the cubic foot, and the number of heat units may be reduced, in proportion, as the price is reduced.

Ald. Schairer moved that Mr. Packham be allowed the floor. Adopted.

After which, the chair having stated the question to be: "Shall this ordinance pass as amended?"

The yeas and nays being called, the ordinance, as amended, passed as follows:
