ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

His Honor, the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor:

The Board of Health, and Health Officer submit their annual report. Whole number of deaths during the past year, one hundred and thirty-six. The diseases causing death and thirty-six. The diseases causing death and the number of deaths from each disease are as follows, viz: Consumption, 19; heart disease, 13; old age, 11; pneumonia, 7; la grippe, 6; cancer, 5; infant diseases, not classified, 7; dropsy 5; cholera infantum, 5; apoplexy, 4; paralysis, 4; scarlet fever, 4; blood poison, 4; childbirth, 4; rheumatism, 4; peritonitis, 3; croup, 2; convulsions 4; brights disease 2; diphtheria, 2; softening of the brain, 2; jaundice 2; accidents, 2; brain disease, 3; poisoned from eating canned fish, 1. Inflamation of the stomach, nervous prostration, ulcer, billious fever, typhoid fever, spinal softening, pleurisy, diabetes melitus, sunstroke, drowned, burn, diabetes melitus, sunstroke, drowned, burn, one each; making a very low death-rate comparing with other cities.

We would recommend that your honorable and wise Council should make an appropriation or create a fund to be used by the Board, of Health, in emergencies; and by the consent of the Common Council, Board of Public Works, and Fire Department, to pay for property destroyed by fire; by the order of the Board of Health, to prevent the spreading of dispared destroyed by the public board of the spreading of th diseases dangerous to the public health of the city of Ann Arbor; also to defray any other

expense necessary to renovate or disinfect. The time is fast approaching when the cholera The time is fast approaching when the choiera "scare" will make its appearance. With a prospect of an unusual amount of travel through our city during the summer and autumn, with a possibility of contagious diseases being brought to us from foreign countries, we would recommend that another "thorough" house to house inspection be made at once and the whole city be thoroughly "thorough" house to house inspection be made at once, and the whole city be thoroughly renovated before the hot weather commences. In order to do this it will be necessary to increase the salary of your health inspector who did much for the city the past year for a very small salary. The Board of Health wish to recognize the courtesy and efficiency of the Police Department during the past year for their promptness in the execution of the duties imposed on them by the board their promptness duties imposed on them by the board.

The question of sewers does not need agitation, but the health and cleanliness of the city needs constant care and watching.
