The undersigned, the Board of Public Works, do hereby report the several sidewalks by us constructed at the expense of the street fund of the city of Ann Arbor, during the year 1893, and since the 17th day of October, 1892, being the date of our last report, do hereby certify the cost and expense of the same, as well as the description of the land and premises in front or adjacent to which the said several sidewalks were caused to be constructed as follows, that is to say:

On and along the west side of S. Ashley street in front of the property of Gottlieb Schneider, described as follows: A strip of land lying east of and adjoining lots 1 and A, block 5, s. r. 2 east, and extending in equal width of the said lot, to the west line of south Ashley street, W. S. Maynard's first addition to the city of Ann Arbor.

Length of walk, eight rods.

Width of walk, five feet

Total cost of walk including necessary grading, \$38.00.

On and along the west side of N. Division street, in front of the property of the David DeForest estate, described as follows: bounded on the north by Meuth's land, east by Division street, south by Fohey and Burke's land, and west by Detroit street; block 4, north range 6 east, being parts of lots 7 and 8.

Length of walk, eight rods.

Width of walk, five feet.

Total cost of walk including necessary grading, \$28.00.

WHEREAS, It is the sense of this council that the reservoir of the Ann Arbor Water Company needs a thorough cleaning out, and that no more opportune time than the present will come.

Resolved, That said Ann Arbor Water Company is hereby ordered to draw off all the water from said reservoir, forthwith, and thoroughly clean the same; that said Ann Arbor Water Company is hereby ordered to keep a direct pressure on the water main sufficient to throw six streams one hundred and ten feet high at the court house, as specified in their contract with this city, from the time said reservoir is emptied until sufficient water is pumped into it again to give the required reservoir pressure; that the chair appoint a committee of three members of this council to superintend the work of cleaning the reservoir, and report to this council at its next regular meeting.
