COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen:—On Monday last, at the request of Gov. John T. Rich, I attended a meeting of citizens held in the city of Detroit, called together for the purpose of devising means to relieve those who are suffering in the upper penin-sula. You have been informed through the public press of the action of that meeting. The committee which was apointed to visit the upper peninsula are now there investigating the situa-It appears from the partial reports that this committee has already made that several thousand people must be supplied with food and clothing during the entire winter. Unquestionably the people of this city and of Washtenaw county stand ready to do their full share of this charitable work. necessary, however, to devise some plan of operation which will give every one who desires an opportunity to contribute to this object. The plan ought therefore, in my judgment, to include the entire county.

I would suggest that the Council appoint a local relief committee for this city, and that you request the Common Council of Ypsilanti and the village and township boards of the several villages and townships in the county to appoint similar local committees, with the understanding that the chairmen of these several committees shall constitute a general relief committee for Washtenaw County. Such general committee might meet at the Court house in this city, say on the 14th of this month, organize and adopt some general and systematic plan which shall be deemed adequate and ef-

fective.

I would also suggest that the local committee appointed by you be requested to take immediate steps, either independently or, in conjunction with the

several charitable organizations of this city, to have a house-to-house canvass made, for the purpose of ascertaining if some of our own citizens are not in need of assistance at this time, or may not be before the winter is past. It often happens that there are needy persons who are too sensitive to make their wants known, or are too independent to beg. I have no personal knowledge or any reliable information, that there is a single family in our city in want, but it is a fact that a large number of our people depend upon their daily earnings for their daily bread, and that to-day they are out of work and they may be out of bread also. The situation demands of us knowledge of the facts and that we do not suffer anyone to want through our carelessness or negligence.
