FROM THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.

To the Common Council:
The Board of Public Works, as directed by resolution of your honorable body, beg leave to submit the following report of its doings in the matter of bids for the construction of the ends of culvert across creek on Fountain street, between Miller avenue and Cherry street.

The Board caused notice of its wants to be published in the Ann Arbor Argus, and also distributed said notice among local contractors; and as a result, on the day set for closing such offer, had two bids as follows: John Mahlke, \$277, and Koch Bros., furnishing all labor and material, and paying the entire length of creek bed, at \$258.

All things considered, the Board recommend that the bid of Koch Bros. be accepted, and that a contract be made with said Koch Bros., at contract price, \$258.

The Board also submits the following That estimates be asked for from engineers for drawing a map of the entire city, which shall show all grades, monuments, and also show line of sewers, water and gas mains, on a scale of one-fourth inch to the rod, the same to be completed in one year from date of contract, said engineer also do all necessary and regular work as shall be required of him by the Board of Public Works.

The Board recommend that the matter be referred to the Committee on Streets.

FROM BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Honorable Common Council: Mayor, President, Recorder and Aldermen of the City of Ann Arbor.

We beg leave to make the following report relative to the condition of the water supplied the city by the Receiver, A. K. Hale, of A. A. Water Company: The water is supplied from twelve flowing wells ranging in size from two to six inches in diameter and from sixty to seventy-five feet deep. The water is wholesome, pure and palatable. The Board of Health was invited by the receiver of the A. A. Water Co., to make a thorough inspection of the water supply furnished the city, which was accepted by the full board May 1st, 1894. We found the grounds, buildings, and catch basons in a wholesome and sanitary condition. To relieve the anxiety of everybody, we have had the water analyzed and herewith submit the analysis for publication. This analysis shows that the water supply furnished by said water company is exceptionally pure, and there is no authenticated evidence to show that the water supplied by the Ann Arbor Water Company causes disease.

Your Committee on Streets and the Board of Public Works were on May 18th notified by the Street Commissioner that the culvert on Miller avenue, west of Seventh street, was in a dangerous condition, your Committee and the Board of Public Works in a body visited said culvert, and find that about 33 feet of said culvert has caved in and the balance of the culvert is greatly out of repair and not safe for public travel. While the flow of the stream is not a large one, your Committee would therefore recommend that the Board of Public Works cause a culvert built with two 24-inch sewer pipe laid side by side, according to specification drawn by the City Engineer and submitted by the Board of Public Works.

REPORT FROM THE COMMITTEE ON PRINTING.

To the Common Council:

Your committee to whom was referred the matter of preparing specifications for bids for

printing would respectfully report that they have placed in a scrap book in the city clerks office samples of all forms of printing now in use by the city and would recommend that the city clerk be instructed to ask for bids on each form in said scrap book, and the Clerk when in want of any work, to award the job of any form to the lowest bidder.

We would also recommend that bids be asked for from the newspapers of the city for printing the official proceedings of the Common Council and Board of Public Works in the newspapers and in pamphlet form, the same as last year, also the printing of the ordinances in newspaper. All bids shall be by the 1,000 ems for printing the proceedings in the newspapers and ordinances and by the page for the pamphlets.
