SIDEWALK GRADE RESOLUTION.

By Ald. Coon.

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Council the grade of the sidewalk on the north side W. Washington street ought to be changed and fixed and established, to the end that such street may be suitable for public travel. Therefore,
